Major J. E. Gobeil, General Superintendent of Government Telegraphs, on Trip of Inspection



## INSPECTOR SANDYS-WUNSCH HERE FOR TEMPORARY DUTY

For the purpose of taking charge temporarily of the local detachment of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in place of Inspector S. T. Wood, who lies ill in hospital in Regina, Inspector T. S. Sandys-Wunsch of Vancouver arrived in the city from the south on the Prince Rupert this morning.

Inspector Sandys-Wunsch is one of the best known officers of the entire force of "red coats" and has seen considerable service in the north. He was last here in his official capacity some two years ago for the trial of Liard River Indians who were brought out of the northern country by him and his detachment on charges of witchcraft murder. During the last summer he was again in the Cassiar country to establish a new police post. Inspector Sandys-Wunsch is also a crack revolver shot and is a former world champion.

## PRINCE GEORGE

The city of Prince George will probably close the current year with a credit balance of \$2,000 or \$3,000 it is announced by Ald. Moffatt, chairman of the finance committee. Expenditures for the fire department, including the purchase of a \$4,000 fire truck, have been taken care of out of the current year's revenue.

A successful bazaar was held by the Catholic Women's League. Raffle winners included Mrs. G. Mealing, Mr. Fortin, Mrs. Hedlund, H. Kennedy (McBride), Mrs. A. M. Patterson, Mr. Rothie, Mrs. Al Johnson, Mrs. P. W. Landon, Mrs. Robertson and Miss Florence Lambert.

Major W. L. Carruthers of Wrangell, divisional commander of the Salvation Army, has been in Prince George during the past week assisting Capt. Lyons in her effort to raise money to cover the cost of the new hall being erected here. The cost of the building will be 2,000, half of which money is required to be raised by local subscription, the balance being loaned by army headquarters.

Judge Robertson, in County Court here, sustained the conviction by Stendary Magistrate Charlson at Vancouver of Charles Nichol on the charge of having in his possession mash suitable for the manufacture of spirits. His Honor, however, remitted a sentence of thirty days imprisonment which had been imposed in addition to a fine of 200.

Fishing in the vicinity of Prince George, in the opinion of R. W. McCord, fisheries guardian, is good and here exists no immediate necessity for stocking. With one or two exceptions, he takes on the Fraser River watershed have as much fish in them as the food will carry. Six-mile Lake, in which there has been a marked improvement in fishing, is named by Mr. McCord as the most important lake for Prince George residents as it can be reached in less than an hour.

Mrs. F. A. Matheson, who has been identified with the Women's Institute movement at eastern points, read an interesting paper at a meeting of the local institute this week in the City Hall on the aims and objects of the institute which has become international in growth, having attained a large membership in Canada, the United States and England.

Messrs. McMonigle and Walkins will rest out the commercial fishing in Francois Lake this fall, having laid in a large supply of nets. Grey trout have been observed in the lake which have been said to weigh around forty-five pounds and the ferryman reports having passed through a large school of fish from six to eight feet long. These are believed to be sturgeon although such fish have not yet been taken in the lake.

The log scale for Prince George district made a large gain during the month of September when a total scale of 15,591,592 feet was recorded, the large majority of it being spruce. This was a gain of three million feet over September 1926 but, for the nine months of the year, the 1927 scale is eighteen million feet short of that for the corresponding months in 1926.

F. J. Shearer addressed the Prince George Retail Merchants' Association this week on fire insurance.

A strong delegation consisting of C. A. Payne, H. G. Parry, M.L.A., R. W. Alward, W. K. Nicholls, W. L. Armstrong and J. H. Johnson will be sent by the Prince George Board of Trade to Edmonton to support General F. A. Sutton in the representations he will make to the Alberta Government in the matter of building a direct line of railway from the ePace River to Vancouver via Prince George.
