

ACTIVITY IN POLE CUTTING

RECENT COLD WEATHER HAS BEEN GREAT BOON TO INDUSTRY, ESPECIALLY AROUND REMO

The past few weeks of real old time winter weather has been a great boon to those engaged in the pole industry, particularly at Remo, says the Omineca Herald. Here thousands of poles that were left in the bush last winter because of the lack of snow are now finding their way to the river and railway and will in due course be shipped to their respective destinations.

John Vigor who has a contract there has made good progress with his tractor which has materially facilitated getting out this year's cut as well as some of last winter's. Thos. Ross has several teams engaged in cleaning up his contract there and if the winter weather holds good for a short time longer he expects to have his poles all out of the woods where he can haul them in the spring on wagons if necessary. Jos. Thomason, another Remo operator, has been making good progress on his contract and with the assistance of the winter weather will get his poles to the river in contract time. A. Bedore is cutting on the timber limit owned by A. Y. Wilson and Mrs. J. K. Frost. He has a comparatively short haul and does not anticipate any difficulty in keeping abreast of his contract schedule.

Altogether the woods in the vicinity of Remo are a hive of activity. The many men and teams engaged are much in evidence. The river has frozen over making crossing at present on the ferry impossible and hardly yet safe enough to cross with teams. In a short time this difficulty will have passed and all will be well.



The reply, coming an hour later, stated that the Ketchikan team was unable to arrive owing to the illness of two players. The series was at once called off and announcement to this effect was announced as widely as possible which, however, did not prevent many fans to climb the hill to the Exhibition Hall, only to be disappointed on arrival there.

The United States, winner of five Olympic tennis titles in 1924 at Paris, is not likely to defend any of them in the international games at Amsterdam in 1928, because of the dates selected for the next Olympic competition. Under the schedule recently decided upon, the Olympic tennis championships next year will take place August 5 to 12. This would interfere with the national championships and Davis Cup schedule, always well under way by the middle of August, and prevent the sending of top ranking stars abroad. Vincent Richards, now a professional, and Helen Willis, won the men's and women's singles titles at Paris in 1924.

One of the promising contenders for the title held by Gene Tunney, psychologist and literateur when out of the prize ring, came within one ace of being a singer. If Jack Delaney, the French Canadian, had had enough money in 1919 to take music lessons some one else might have been light-heavyweight champion in 1926, and he might not have been an aspirant for heavyweight honors. Seven years ago Ovila Chapdelaine, better known as Jack Delaney, was a toolmaker. He was sure of his job and got fair pay, but was ambitious to make a lot of money quickly. He had heard of fabulous salaries paid to famous singers and felt that his own voice was an asset. He found, however, that years of training and much money for lessons was necessary.
