total of 84,500 pounds was sold of  
which four Canadian vessels disposed  
of 41,000 pounds at bids ranging from  
15.7c and 7c to 18.6c and 7c, while a  
similar number of Canadians marketed  
43,500 pounds from 12.8c and 6.5c  
to 14.8c and 7.5c.
