Marquis de Lieto and His Companions Outfitting in London for Three-Year

LONDON, Feb. 24 .- The Marquis de Lieto, a young Italian, and three other adventurous Italians, one of whom has been in London buying equipment, are about to start 15,000 mile voyage in a 12-ton fishing boat for explore the Upper Orinoco River-the big South American river which runs through Venezuelaand cruise around both shores of the Atlantic Ocean. Ervin Pfister, the second in command, said they were going to explore the unknown upper reaches of the Magdalena and Orinoco Rivers, and a photographic survey would be made. After exploring the Orinoco they propose to proceed by way of the West they will sail for Norway and Denmark and thence to London, returning Rome through the French canals. They expect to be away about three years.
