REGULATION FOR BUS SERVICES IN ALBERTA

License Fee Based on Number of Miles to be Travelled and Passenugers Carried

June 1. - Regulations vehicles on auto bus lines garrying passengers and freight on the highways, have been issued.

No public vehicle shall be operated by any person with defective sight, or who has not the full use of both arms and hands, and both legs and feet, nor by any person under the age of 21

are revocable unless service is commenced within 30 days. The fee for operation is one-tenth of a cent per passenger mile of travel over class A roads, and one-fifteenth of a cent over class B roads, and passenger miles of travel are to be calculated by taking the maximum seating capacity of each vehicle and multiplying this by the number of miles to be travelled in the month, on the scheduled route for which the license is issued. Fees are to be paid each month.

An indemnity bond must be provided for each bus, and all accidents must be notified to the government Ten days' discontinuance of service is cause for suspension or forfeiture of the

Busses must be provided with chains, brakes must be tested daily, and a fire extinguisher carried.

A time-table showing the scheduled times of arrival and departure of each bus, must be filed with the government for approval.

Maximum amounts payable in respect of injuries to persons, or of property loss or damage, are fixed as follows: 12-passenger vehicle, \$30,000 maximum covering all claims in any one accident, and a maximum of \$10, Mabbs, is due in port tomorrow from to any one claimant; more than 12-Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte passenger busses, \$50,000 and \$10,000 respectively
