### Enthusiastic Audience of 400 Acclaims Concert Series Artists

An attractive singer and an amusing accompanist, both of whom can add a great musical gift to their other attributes, last night took an audience of 400 around another pleasant turn of the Alaska Music Trail.

As soon as soprano Greta Menzel's appearance on the stage drew admiring exclamations, and pianist Thomas Mayer's wit drew laughs, it was obvious that the concert at the Civic Centre was going to be a success. But that initial reaction was only half of it.

From the first clear, ringing notes, it was apparent that Miss Menzel has the "silvery voice" which critics have acclaimed. Without subjecting it to any extraordinary tests for the sake of proving its versatility at the expense of the music, she went charmingly through a program of well-liked selections in Italian, German, French, Spanish and English.

Interspersed with these were entertaining remarks by Mr. Mayer, a gifted pianist in his own right, who described the background and meaning of the music about to be sung.

As an introduction to "Vienna, City of my Dreams" by Stoltz, and "Tales from the Vienna Woods" by Johann Strauss, he

explained:  
"In Vienna everyone lives in coffee houses. You do not invite a person to dinner. You invite him to the coffee house. There you have coffee, two glasses of water, and more coffee."

But Miss Menzel, who is from Vienna, proved that the city is distinguished for other reasons. From the movingly sad strains of "Lasciate Mi Morire," a 17th century composition by Monteverdi, to the gay Spanish folk songs, she showed herself in complete understanding of the mood.

The quality of her singing was, however, the most striking feature. Her voice has a sweet bell-like tone which last night she varied with such skill that even the softest notes could be heard at the far end of the hall. Her rendition of "At Dawn" by Charles Wakefield Cadman was an instance of this.

At the close of the enjoyable evening a reception for the artists was held by members of the Civic Centre Concert Auxiliary.

### Wounded Crane Dies After Medical Help

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP)—A wounded whooping crane, flown here from Canada in an effort to save its life, died of lung congestion here.

The big, rare bird had been shot, a wing and leg broken, when Ralph Steuk found it near Regina about the time the whoopers were starting their winter migration to south Texas.

The crane was flown to the San Antonio zoo by the Canadian Natural Wildlife Resources Bureau and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Dr. R. L. Shea, zoo veterinarian, amputated part of the broken wing and put a plastic cast on the broken leg. But he said the whooper had complications, including lung congestion.

Until lately, the crane was eating well on a diet of fish and boiled eggs. James L. Chism, curator of birds, said the wounds were healing well. But treatments failed to clear up the whooper's lungs.

Howard Dodgen, secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission, said at Austin that others of the vanishing species had arrived at the Arkansas wildlife refuge on the gulf coast and were doing well.

ests and I think we should have something concrete from the bus line."

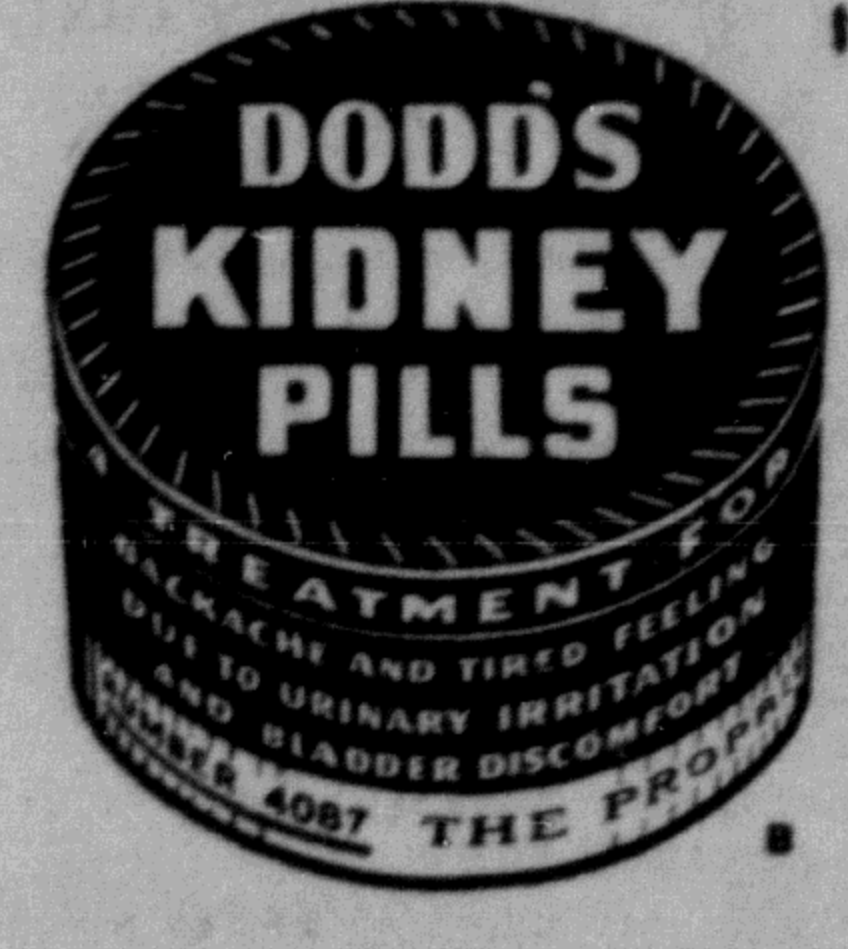
It was stressed that council can not grant the increase, but will be asked only to agree to the proposal.
