The construction of the road from Prince Rupert to Terrace was again iscussed by the city-council last night when Alderman Jos. Greer referred to the work of the comhittee which had been appointed to further the project. He said that the committee had had several meetings and had enlisted the country. They had received replies from the greater number of these and all had expressed their sympathy with the plan. They had been asked to interview their provincial members on the question. 
