### Handicapped Sportsmen Show Courage

LONDON-Two young British sportsmen have proved that adveristy and crushing odds can be overcome by courage and determination.

The lads are 20-year-old John Shepherd, a product of London's playing fields, stricken with infantile paralysis 18 months ago, and a New Zealander, 23-yearold Stuart Craig, totally blind.

Shepherd, whose one aim was to become a "big time" soccer player, was put out of action by polio six months after he had been signed as an amateur by the Milwall Club of the English League, third division.

Medical specialists shattered his hopes with the bad news he would walk with a permanent limp and that his active playing days were ended.

But Shepherd refused to accept the verdict. After a period of convalescence he went into secret training. He was up early every morning for special setting-up exercises, following them with light road work and then a session of ball dribbling and shooting.


