

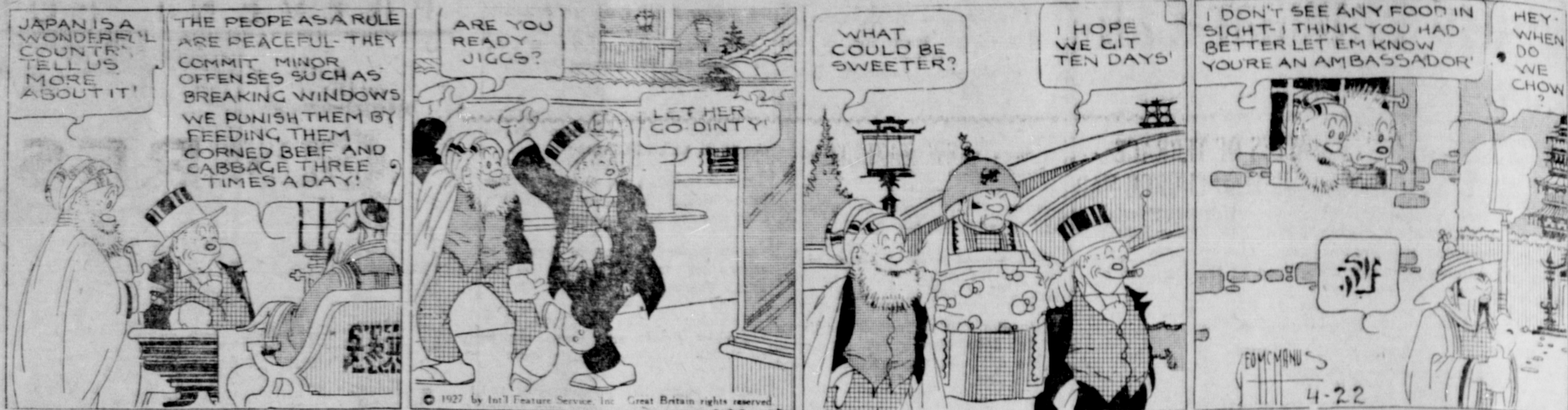
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## BRINGING UP FATHER



### FRED THOMSON IN ANOTHER WESTERN

Cow Boys, Gamblers, Prize Fights, Rodeos and Dance Halls in Tonight's Picture

In "The Dangerous Coward," coming to the Westholme Theatre tonight "Wildcat" Red retains his position as leader in Chaparral, a small Western town, by putting on prize fights and rodeos. His mistress is Conchita, queen of his dance hall, but he is in love with May, the niece of David McGinn, the town drunkard. May, however, loves Bob Trent (Fred Thomson), a stalwart cowboy.

Red O'Hara, a fight trainer, drifts into Chaparral and recognizes Bob Trent as "Lightning Kid" a famous fighter. Bob tells Red he has given up fighting because two years ago—although fighting clean—he injured "The Weasel" another fighter, so badly that he was maimed for life.

The Weasel follows Bob wherever he goes, to blackmail him, and when he comes to Chaparral, instantly becomes friendly with "Wildcat" Red and the two decide to break Bob.

The big fight of the season arranged by "Wildcat" is to be held between Steve Benson and the "Tulare Kid," a protégé of Wildcat's.

Red O'Hara recognizes Steve Benson as "Battling" Benson, a well-known fighter, and realizes that the Tulare Kid whom he is managing, hasn't a chance. All Chaparral's money has been placed on the Tulare Kid on the advice of Wildcat while Wildcat's own money has been placed on Battling Benson.

Red knows that his fighter must win. He knocks the Tulare Kid cold, and begs Bob to fight in his place. Bob refuses.

Since his promise to his dying mother that he would never fight again, Bob cannot bear the sight of the arena. He sits in the cafe while preparations for the fight are going on.

Into the cafe comes Conchita followed by the Weasel, who attempts to embrace her. She spurns him as a cripple, but he straightens up and tells her he has been playing Bob to wheedle money out of him. Bob sees this and happily hastens to the arena.

After a thrilling fight, Bob knocks Battling Benson out. Pandemonium reigns... his ovation nearly raises the roof.

During the fight, Wildcat and the Weasel steal the stakes which Wildcat has been holding, by substituting the bag with one filled with papers, and leaving it in the care of David McGinn, who is intent on the fight. The two make for the border in Wildcat's Ford. The loss of the money is discovered. Old David is accused of the theft and the raging crowd is for lynching him. May rushes to her uncle. The angry men almost kill her.

Bob leaps on Silver King in pursuit of the two thieves. After a hot chase he jumps into their car, and takes the wheel from Wildcat's hands. They fight, and Bob is thrown out of the car just before it goes over a steep embankment. Wildcat and the Weasel are killed.

Bob returns to Chaparral with the money, and he and May find happiness in their love.

The pirate Lafitte is involved—and it is his job to start on the expedition of rescue. His activities end with a battle on the high seas and a rescue of the heroine.

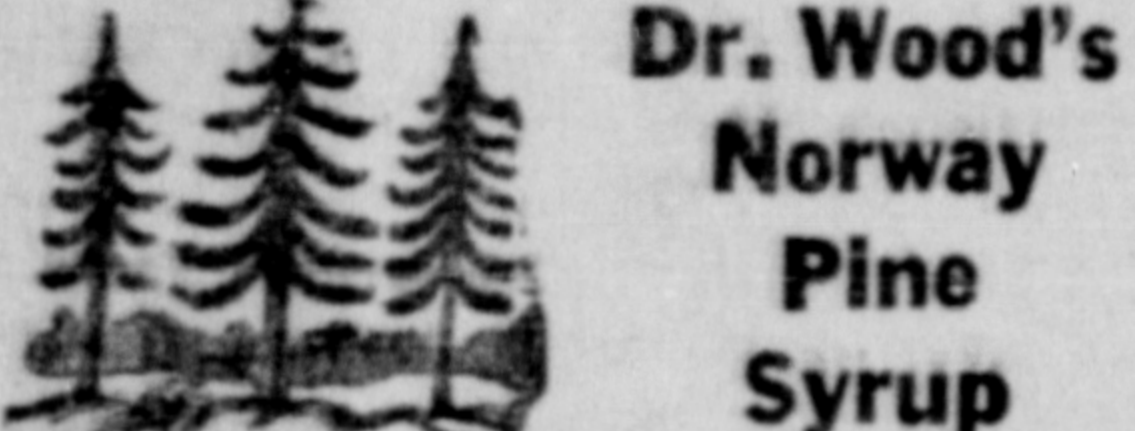
Both Ricardo Cortez and Florence Vidor strive to invest their work with dramatic feeling. The film is rich in its costumes and its backgrounds.

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### SPORT CHAT

It is often very difficult early in the season to interest the public in sports when the weather is disagreeable. Right now, it is said, that little interest is being taken in baseball although the opening games should be played in the course of a few weeks. As the season advances and outside teams are brought in for games the sporting public begins to take the game seriously and large attendances are generally present at these matches. To make the game at all interesting, however, it is necessary to have a great deal of practice and plenty of enthusiasm for several weeks in advance. This can be best cultivated by city league games which provide the fans with an opportunity of backing their favorite aggregation. The closer these contests are, the greater the amount of local interest taken. For this reason, a three team league is far superior to a two team league for there is always the chance of the tail-enders defeating the league leaders and thus upsetting the dope of the wise ones. It is the uncertainty of the game which attracts and, if a league is composed of two teams—with one far superior to the other—interest soon begins to wane. All those who are seeking to make baseball an attraction for the summer should have the support of all fans and players.

A review of hockey business, the work of basketball, baseball, present financial standing, proposals for Dominion Day and other matters were discussed at a recent meeting of Smithers Athletic Club. The bank book showed a balance of about \$125, and in addition there is a favorable balance of \$100 in the basketball division, which included the \$50 grant from the parent organization. It was decided to put on a membership drive and in all sports conducted by the association, the stipulation that members of all teams must hold membership in the organization will be rigidly enforced. In baseball it was the opinion that two good teams could be fielded this year. It was made known that the C.N.R. Athletic Club would have a team in the field, and between the two organizations some good games are promised. A baseball committee was appointed to conduct this branch of sport. There was much talk on a program for Dominion Day, this having been turned over to the Athletic Club by the central committee. Many suggestions were offered, but final plans were placed in the hands of a committee to report back at a later meeting.

Following up enthusiasm shown by youngsters last year, some real encouragement is being offered Smithers children to take up lacrosse this summer, and it is expected that several teams will be out to provide games during the season and also to participate in the field sports of Dominion Day. The Native Sons of Canada are behind the move to help retain for Canada the premiership in lacrosse, and through donations applied on the actual cost they are making sticks available at less than half cost. This will put a \$2.00 stick in the hands of children for 75 cents, and other grades will be sold at similar reductions from cost. Just as Canada's great winter game is hockey, so her national summer game is lacrosse, and the United States have started to develop both of these games on a large scale. Canadians are out to retain leadership in both, and to encourage this great game many organizations are paying a big share of the cost of sticks.
