IMMENSE THRONG GREETS LINDBERGH

BRITISH WARSHIPS ARE SENT TO EGYPT AS PRECAUTION

Huge Crowd Gathered at Croydon to Welcome Lindbergh to England

APPROXIMATELY ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND MEN, WOMEN AND CHILDREN WATCHED ARRIVAL OF YOUNG AMERICAN AVIATOR

CROYDON, May 30.—Approximately one hundred thousand people greeted the famous transatlantic flyer, Captain Charles Lindbergh on his arrival here from Brussels last evening. It was one of the largest, wildest and most enthusiastic gatherings of men, women and children ever assembled in England to welcome a citizen of any nation.

Breaking the barriers by which they were held back, the huge rowd swarmed over the field just before the young American aviator landed and almost robbed him of a landing place. After circling until sufficient space was cleared to allow of his descent, he stopped several hundred yards from where Sir Samuel Hoare, the British aviation minister, Lady Hoare and many other officials were waiting to welcome him.
