**WOMEN VOTE IN BRITAIN**

NEXT ELECTION TO SEE FIVE MILLION MORE WITH RIGHT TO FRANCHISE

WILL OUTNUMBER MEN

LONDON, May 30.—(Canadian Press).—The Government's promised bill giving women the vote at 21 years of age will give women a majority of more than 2,000,000 in the next General Election. At present men have a majority of three million, because women under 30 years of age are not enfranchised. The voting strength computed last winter was: Men, 12,697,790; Women, 9,592,222. The reduction in voting age will give the vote to an additional 5,126,000 women. In addition, simplification of the voting qualifications for women voters will result in enfranchisement of a large number of women at present ineligible to vote, although they are over 30 years of age.

It is believed that in 70 per cent of the constituencies the women electors will outnumber the men. At present this is the case in five constituencies only, South Kensington, Cheltenham, Eastings, Glasgow Hillhead and South Edinburgh, though in a few other constituencies the women equal the men. The Labor Party will submit for second reading on Friday, May 20, a private member's Bill proposing to carry out the reform which the Government announced. The Government will certainly be pressed to accept the Bill in view of their decision, but it is understood that they are not likely to agree to any further action being taken before next session. It is not likely that such a delay would prevent the younger women from voting in the next General Election.

decision was that Andrew Bonar Law, Canadian, who for a brief time was Premier, was known to favor an alteration. Towards the end of 1922, he declared: "I have been a consistent supporter of woman's suffrage, and, even at the time the Franchise Bill of 1918 was passed, I felt that the discrimination in age between men and women could not be permanent. I think so still."

No question of redistribution arises. The Act of Representation of 1918 provided for redistribution on the basis of one member for each 70,000 population and naturally this position is unchanged by the government's bill. The Labor party agree with the decision that redistribution is not necessary on the ground that the vote is not given to a new class of electors, as was the case when women were enfranchised for the first time in 1918.

**POLITICAL FORTUNES**

There are considerable differences of opinion as to the effect which the proposal will have upon the political fortunes of the parties, the Times remarks, although it is agreed that to some extent the change must be a leap in the dark. One result will be to produce abnormal majorities in a few constituencies held by each party. Labor will be particularly annoyed by the accession of strength in the mill districts of say Lancashire, where the number of women workers under 30 is extremely large. The increased cost of a General Election is one undepreciable result of the bill. This is not merely in electoral machinery but in expenses of candidates.

**STERILIZATION OF MENTAL DEFECTIVES**

A bill providing for the sterilization of mental defectives was introduced in the Alberta Legislature during the recent session by Hon. George Hoadley, minister of health, says the Bulletin of the Canadian National Committee for mental hygiene. It was introduced, the Minister explained, for the purpose of bringing the subject before the House, the bill being withdrawn later with the intimation that it would be re-introduced at the next session for final consideration. In British Columbia, too, sterilization is being discussed. The Royal Commission which has been investigating mental conditions in that Province for the past year recommended, among other things, the sterilization, under certain conditions, of mentally defective persons, and the subject has since attracted a great deal of attention in the press and from the public generally.

**PROXY MARRIAGE OF DUTCH WOMAN TO LLOYDMINSTER MAN**

LLOYDMINSTER, Alta., May 30.—After marrying her husband, Jan Koning, by proxy in Amsterdam, and later in person here at the Presbyterian church, Jacoba Koning is now getting acquainted near here with Canadian farming on the prairies. Following the custom in Holland for brides to marry by proxy those who are in distant lands, Jacoba married Jan's brother. A notary of Lloydminster drew up the necessary papers permitting her to marry William. These were forwarded to the minister of justice in Holland, and after investigation they received the endorsement of Queen Wilhelmina, and the approval of the British ambassador was also necessary. William and Jacoba went before the magistrate of Amsterdam, and left him as Mrs. Jan Koning and her brother-in-law.
