It was too damp last evening to proceed with further games in the tennis championship tournaments. Weather permitting, there will be some events tonight.

Dr. and Mrs. E. S. Tait and Brian Tait returned last night on the Prince George to Victoria after spending a couple of weeks in the north, the men being on hunting bent.

Harvest Festival services will be held in Presbyterian Church on Sunday, Sept. 25. The church will be open Saturday afternoon to receive gifts of flowers, fruits and vegetables.

There is a big demand for the Daily News today as a result of the big fight. The full report is being read by several hundred extra people today, particularly at outside points.

C.N.R. steamer Prince John, Capt. E. Macbe, is not expected to arrive before tomorrow from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands. The vessel has had a number of delays this trip on account of extra-light business.

Mr. and Mrs. E. Aldcroft and son of Dawson, who arrived in the city on Wednesday from the north, called last night on the Prince George for Vancouver. Mr. and Mrs. Aldcroft resided in Prince Rupert in the early days.

Mrs. Jack Wells returned to the city on the Cardena this morning after having spent several months at Chilliwack, part of which time she was seriously ill, having recovered now. Her husband is a well known local fishing boat owner.

Mr. and Mrs. William Vanderlip, residents of Terrace for several years, arrived in the city from the interior on yesterday afternoon's train and called last night on the Prince George for Victoria where they will take up future residence.

Union steamer Cardena, Capt. A. Johnstone, arrived in port at 6.30 this morning from the south and sailed at 8.30 for the Naas River. The vessel is due back to sail from here at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning for Vancouver and waypoints.
