

Boundary Tribunal Decided That Town Belonged to United States in 1903

(Juneau Empire)

The proposal of Sir Hugh Denison, Trade Commissioner from Australia, for the internationalization of the port of Skagway recalls that Skagway was the principal objective of the Canadians in the Alaska-Canadian boundary dispute that occupied attention beginning shortyears. It was finally settled by the Alaska Boundary Tribunal, sitting in London in 1903, which gave Skagway to Alaska. The Alaska Boundary Tribunal consisted to two Canadians, two Americans and one Englishman-Lord Alverstone, then Lord Chief Justice of England. The American members of the Tribunal were Elihu Root of New York and former Senator George Turner of Washington, Jacob M. Dickinson of Nashville, later secretary of war in the cabinet of President Taft, was chief counsel for the United States. He was assisted by the late William Watson of Alabama and Philadelphia and other assistants, among them former Senator James Hamilton Lewis.

JOINT COMMISSION Prior to the trial before the Alaska Boundary Tribunal, a Joint High Comnission, created in 1898, had considered various American and Canadian matters in dispute, the Alaska boundary among them. Senator Charles W. Fairbanks of Indiana was one of the American mem pers of the Joint High Commission and Chairman of the American Commission. ers, and as such visited Skagway in

The Joint High Commissioners failed to reach an agreement on the Alaska boundary question and the matter was referred to the Alaska Boundary Tribunal.

There were two points of dispute between the United States and Canada in the interpretation of the English-Russian treaty in 1825 which established the Russian-American boundary The treaty provided that the boundary should be along the summit of the coast range of mountains except where it was more than ten marine leagues from the coast, then it should be ten marine leagues inland from the sinu-

osities of the coast. DIFFERENCE OF OPINION

The Canadians contended that "sinuosities" of the coast meant a line that would be drawn from headland to headland where there were bays, inlets or other indentations. The Americans contended that it meant the actual coast line, that the boundary line should thirty miles inland from the heads of indentations just as it would be thirty miles inland from the ocean line where ne mainland extended to the ocean. The Americans also contended that there was no coast range of mountains

that the mountains along the coast were simply groups of mountains, broken at many places by rivers and valleys and, therefore, the line should be thirty miles inland at all points.

The Canadians disputed this claim. Lord Chief Justice Alvertone held the balance of power in the Tribunal. held for the United States as to Canada as to the existence of a coast range of moutains. Recent Method of Getting Into United States Discovered by Officials

WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 29.-Bootlegging of birth certificates is a mushroom growth that has developed under the rigid provisions of the restrictive immigration law.

The practice stems from the fact that children of allens born in the United States are citizens and, therefore, entitled to enter the country without references to immigration requirements. No matter how alien their names may be, they can get in without difficulty if they can prove they were born on American soil.

friend abroad wants to come to the United States, where wealth is relatively easy to obtain. Nevertheless, the law takes no cognizance of the friendly nature of such a violation. It is just as much a violation as if the certificate had been sold or loaned for a consideration, as often
