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TOWN PLANNING BETTER KNOWN

RAPID DEVELOPMENT OF TOWN PLANNING IN FUTURE BEST ENSURED BY EDUCATIVE WORK
D. H. BARTLEY TELLS SURVEYORS

OTTAWA, Feb. 7.—(By Canadian Press).—Town planning is making a slow but certain progress in Canada, according to the report of the committee on town planning of the Dominion Land Surveyors Association, presented during the convention here this afternoon by D. H. Bartley, D.L.S.

The committee finds, in reviewing the progress of the year in this world-wide movement, that there are some encouraging signs that better planning of towns and cities is catching on in the Dominion. From east to west across the breadth of Canada it is found that in the larger cities there is an awakening consciousness as to the benefits to be derived. In Montreal the movement is voluntary, an organization having been formed for the development of a plan which can hardly fail to result in the creation of an official city plan sponsored and financed by the city.

In Vancouver action followed the passing of a provincial Town Planning Act. The city promptly appointed a town planning commission and consultant and staff to create a comprehensive plan for the city and environs at a cost of \$40,000, spread over three years. Surrounding municipalities will probably agree on a regional plan.

ALIVE TO ADVANTAGES

Industrial companies who are establishing great enterprises in Canada are keenly alive to the advantages of correct planning of their town sites, Mr. Bartley reported. For instance at Arvida, Que., the Aluminum Company of Canada is laying out the nucleus of a city for its employees on former raw land comprising some six thousand acres. They are proceeding on carefully prepared plans designed for an ultimate population of 40,000. Construction of 270 houses was included in last year's program, and plans include development of roads, sanitary and fire protection and landscape treatment.

In western Canada the town-planning movement is gathering momentum. Certain of the municipalities around Winnipeg are taking steps toward the formation of town plans under Manitoba law, and the city of Edmonton has announced its intention of proceeding similarly. Kitchener, Victoria, and Ottawa are other Canadian cities in which definite progress has been made.

The report concludes: "It is suggested that the dominant course for the rapid advancement of town planning in Canada is a matter of education and persuasion and that the necessary enactments will inevitably follow. If in the development of our young Canadian cities and towns we can by wise planning avoid the creation of slum and tenement districts, we will be in a far more advanced position than could be secured by any frantic efforts in the future to develop lavish civic monuments in an attempt to conceal the squalor of the neglected districts."

THIS IS CANADA WEEK IN BOSTON

TWENTY TO THIRTY THOUSAND DAILY PASSING THROUGH C.N.R. SPORTSMEN'S SHOW

MONTREAL, Feb. 7.—"This is Canada Week in Boston," says a report received from E. G. Poole, fish and game representative of the Canadian National Railways, who is in charge of the National System exhibit at the New England sportsmen's show now being held in that city. From twenty to thirty thousand daily have passed through the exhibits at the sportsmen's show, Mr. Poole states, and everyone of these are clamoring for information on Canada's out-of-doors.

The sportsmen's show has been a much greater drawing card than even its sponsors, the Massachusetts Fish and Game Protective Association, anticipated and the exhibits at the show are more than ninety per cent Canadian. Live moose from New Brunswick, deer, bears and other animals from the same province. Indian guides from that province and from Nova Scotia. Husky dogs from Quebec. Mounted buffalo and other game animals from the National Buffalo Park at Wainwright, and from Jasper National Park. Mounted fish from the famous lakes and streams of the Dominion. All are on exhibition.

DEMAND FOR INFORMATION

The great demand for information on the out-of-doors concerns Canada as a sportsman's paradise, and officials at the Canadian National Railways exhibit, which is one of the most striking in the huge mechanics' building, are kept busy from morning till night answering the thousands of questions placed before them. H. R. Charlton, manager of the advertising bureau Canadian National Railways, who has just returned from the show, stated that there was a live interest shown in everything Canadian. By panoramic views and motion pictures the Canadian National exhibit demonstrated the possibilities of Canada for the sportsman. One of the features which created the greatest interest was a motion film showing the Blanc Bec Trails tourists' snowshoe journeys in Northern Ontario and Quebec forests.

After the first day hundreds of requests for special views of this film were received and so great was the interest in this new feature for winter tourists that addresses and radio talks had to be given explaining the outstanding attractions of Canada's north woods in winter.
