The Moose deserved their win but they had Loblick to thank that there was only one goal against them. He gave a fine display. His best stop was the one-handed from point-blank range.

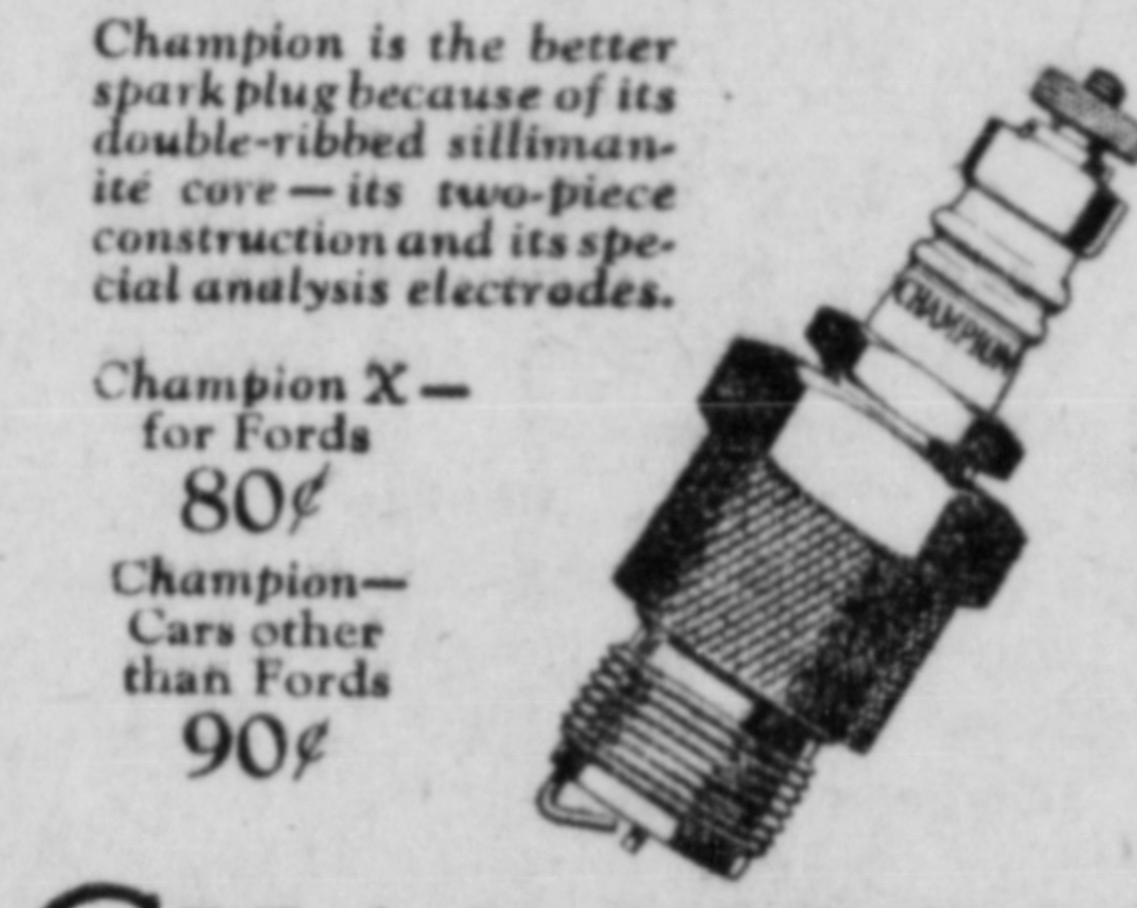
Erskine played his usual clean-kicking game and was very safe. Young Jim Currie did very well both in tackling and kicking.

It is said that during the ownership of the club by the late John T. Brush, McGraw was signed for a salary of \$30,000 a year. When he became an official of the club in 1919 his salary was reported to be \$65,000 a year.
