## ALASKA PLANS COLONIZATION OF TERRITORY

Secretary of Bureau in Seattle Visiting Ketchikan Connection With Scheme

KETCHIKAN, July 30. — Practical colonization of Alaskan lands to the extent that the industries of the territory can absorb new settlers is the present mission of Charles D. Garfield, secretary of the Alaska bureau of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce, who was a passenger on the steamship Yukon, operated by the Alaska Steamship Company, on his way to Seward and Fairbanks.

While his boat was in Ketchikan, Mr. Garfield attended a meeting of the Rotary Club and also conferred with W. F. Schlothman, president of the Ketchikan Chamber of Commerce, about the forthcoming trip of Mayor Landes of Seattle.

### NEW MOVEMENT

"The Seattle Chamber of Commerce," said Mr. Garfield, "has a special committee appointed to look after proposed colonization work in Alaska, a new movement which the Seattle body has taken up in connection with its work for assisting Alaskan enterprises."

"Aside from my regular routine trip to Alaska, my present mission is to get together such data and facts for attracting settlers of the right class to Alaska. I am to be assisted in this work by the Chambers of Commerce in Alaska. The idea is not to start a settlers' boom, but to secure, if possible, enough settlers to engage in farming and grazing to take care of local market conditions."

Speaking about the new mining department of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Garfield said it was making progress, and that the main purpose of the missionary work was to help the prospector finance his property. The work covers the northwest

and Alaska. Mr. Garfield said that each property sent to his office is published in a bulletin which goes to mining investors.

### MINING INDUSTRY

"One of the objects of the work," said Mr. Garfield, "is to teach bankers and others that mining is just as sound investment as any other industry when put on a practical business basis."

He said the object of the chamber is to also create a revolving fund of \$1,000,000 to help develop prospects to the point where mining investors would take hold; also to help establish a mining stock exchange in Seattle.

In referring to work accomplished by the Seattle chamber for Alaska and the northwest, Mr. Garfield cited the Seattle Fur Exchange, which, he said, had grown from a corporation of \$400,000 three years ago to \$3,000,000 worth of business for the present season, and that the exchange was now paying dividends.

## GREAT GATHERING OF EDUCATIONISTS TO BE ENTERTAINED

Diverse Program Arranged by Canadian Teachers For Guests From all Countries

TORONTO, July 30.—Toronto teachers, who are the hosts to the educational army which congregates in the city for the week of August 7-12 for the second biennial conference of the World Federation of Educational Associations, are preparing to entertain the visitors on a large scale. Pageants, concerts, garden parties, excursions and church services are being arranged under capable direction, so that the 6,000 delegates, representing 40 countries, will derive much entertainment from the conference, as well as aid in their chosen work.

On four stages rising one above the other in the Coliseum of the Canadian National Exhibition 1,400 persons will present the most spectacular feature of this section of the program—a symbolic pageant entitled "The Heart of the World." The pageant will be presented on the evening of August 9.

Through the mediums of music, dancing and costuming, the performers will give a colorful picture of the development of the world from savagery to civilization through the influence of education. The pageant will include many national airs, folk songs and folk dances and will terminate with a magnificent finale ensemble representing the world in harmony through the power of the child. The chorus numbers will be rendered by a chorus of 60 soloists, chorus of 30 international groups, chorus of 600 from the Canadian National Exhibition chorus and a chorus of 350 children.
