Waterfront Whiffs

Low Price of Halibut Worries Fisherman — Cow Bay Road Subject of Comment — Halo Society Admits Member

The week along the waterfront has been quiet from the halibut fishing point of view. The week's landings amounted to only 617,960 pounds as compared with last week's total of 913,000 pounds. American landings are down from 641,000 to 465,250, and Canadian boats brought in only 152,700 pounds as compared with 272,000 pounds for the previous week.

There is a continuous discussion regarding the poor prices that are being paid the fishermen for their catches. The top price this week was fourteen cents but mostly the price hovered around ten cents. This is too low the fishermen claim. But in the meantime that is all they get.

Salmon fishing has been more encouraging towards the week-end. There is reported a good run of cohoes at Passage Island and the boys are making as high as \$40 a day. At 60c a piece this means sixty to seventy fish a day which is easily the best so far reported. Jim Thomas is bringing in white salmon for bait. At present he arrived on Tuesdays and Fridays.

Pete Meuse is getting around again though his hand is still on vacation.

The Norwegian in port again for pump repairs caused much favorable comment. With her two 150 horsepower Speedway engines she makes ten knots. The gas-boat dinghy is as speedy a boat as has been seen here.

EXPECT HIGH PRICES HALIBUT THIS FALL

John Dybhavn Tells People of Ketchikan Reason For Slump Here

John Dybhavn, Norwegian consul at Prince Rupert, and manager of the Royal Fish Company, with offices there, believes that the price of halibut will be better this fall, says the Ketchikan Chronicle. The present slump in price, he says, is due to loads of mackerel dumped on the eastern markets, as well as many other kinds of fish, and the further fact that more halibut was caught off the Atlantic this season than ever before.

Mr. Dybhavn arrived on the power boat Delphinium, Captain Hartlin, master. He expected to leave again for home.

He said his recent trip is simply one of pleasure and not connected with his office. Jacob Britt, of Juneau, is the Norwegian consul for southeastern Alaska.

Mr. Dybhavn, in speaking of the halibut market, said Seattle buyings ran ahead of Prince Rupert the forepart of the season, but that the volume of business for May and June at Prince Rupert caught up and passed the volume of last year. Last month the arrivals at Prince Rupert, he said, was ahead of those of last year.

Mr. Dybhavn thought there was every reason to be optimistic for good average prices prevailing for fall halibut.
