Another party of C.N.R. ticket men from the company's offices in the east will arrive in the city the latter part of May and sail for Vancouver on the boat the same evening. This will be the third party which has visited Prince Rupert in the past few months for the purpose of becoming familiar with the various portions of the company's system.

In tow of the tug St. Faith, which arrived during the night, the Millery Canning Co.'s floating cannery Laurel, Whalen, which has been here for the past few months, left at 8 o'clock this morning for Bernard Cove, down the coast from here, where she will be operated this season. The hulk was pulled off the dry dock yesterday afternoon by one of the Rupert Marine Products power tugs and lay anchored in the stream over night.

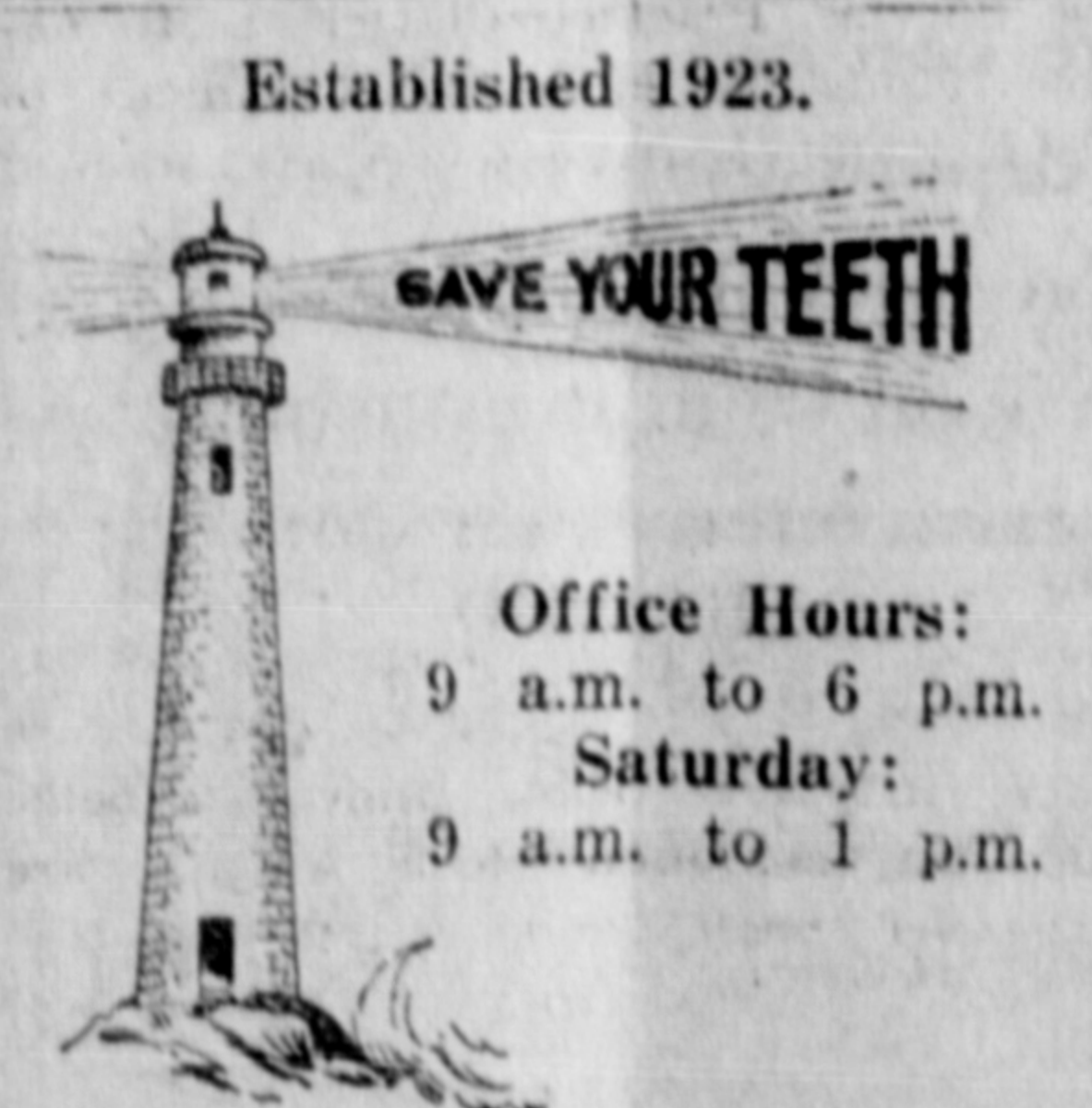

GENERAL REDUCTION IN TELEGRAPH AND TELEPHONE RATES

The government telegraph service have issued a new tariff of rates which will go into effect immediately on the system throughout the north. By new schedule, telegraph rates are placed on a zone basis. Telephone rates have also been reduced and are now on a mileage basis.

As an instance of the reduction in the rates for telephoning, the former rate for a three minute conversation between Atlin and Whitehorse a distance of 122 miles, was \$2.26. It has now been reduced to eighty cents.

FISH TRAP WAR IN PUGET SOUND

CONFLICT IS ON BETWEEN BIG CANNERY MEN AND PURSE SEINE OPERATORS

SEATTLE, April 28.—A new conflict, involving the state fisheries board, last night appeared to have developed between Puget Sound salmon trap owners and so called "big" cannery men on one hand and purse seine operators on the other. The controversy centres around recent orders of the state fisheries board regarding fish traps which purse seiners declare would reduce by fifty per cent their operation on the Sound.

NOT LIVING UP TO CUSTOM DIGNITY IN OLD ONTARIO

TORONTO, April 27.—(Canadian Press)—"Frequently," R. P. Sparks stated before the commissioners at the customs enquiry "our customs office is a back room in a farm house. You have to search for it and when you find it probably a woman comes out in a dirty wrapper to represent the government of Canada. It gives the incoming tourist a very poor impression of Canada and it produces rank inefficiency."

ALLEGED KILLERS ARE COMMITTED FOR TRIAL

VANCOUVER, April 28.—At the conclusion of the preliminary hearing of R. T. Moore and Angus Nicholson on charges of murdering Marshall Douglas by beating him to death in the Hotel Canada recently, Magistrate Henry C. Shaw committed them to stand trial at the present assizes here.

COURT HOLDS CHEQUE RECEIVER'S PROPERTY

VANCOUVER, April 28.—Holding that a marked cheque for \$1,227.98 in possession of E. C. Mayers, and made out by the Sitka Spruce Mills, Ltd., in favor of the Massett Timber Ltd. in settlement of a debt by the former company previous to its going into bankruptcy, was the property of the trustee of the bankrupt company, Mr. Justice Murphy Friday refused to make an order compelling Mr. Mayers to hand the cheque over to the Massett Timber Company. A. Alexander appeared for the trustee.

TORONTO ARTIST WINS PRIZE FOR PAINTING PICTURE OF POULTRY

NEW YORK, April 27.—(Canadian Press)—A former Toronto artist, Mrs. McGilvray Knowles, has just been awarded an interesting prize in New York. At an exhibition of the painter members of the League of American Pen Women she won a prize of \$100 for the best picture. The picture was one of her characteristic representations of chickens.
