

LABOR COMPLAINS HIGH PRICE OF BEER AND WILL BREW OWN

LONDON, Dec. 2 .- The high cost of beer has stirred members of the labor party to action. They propose to brew their own and hope to reduce the price to the consumer by 25 to 40 per cent. A Labor Clubs' Brewery Society, Ltd., has been registered under the industrial provident act with a capital of 15,000 pounds. There are no individual sharebeing held by the clubs.
