Catala Ready for Launching But Southerly Gale Danger to Success of the Venture

A southerly gale was this morning pounding the wrecked steamer Catala and fears were expressed whether she would be too badly injured to allow of her being launched tomorrow as was planned. She is now lying at an angle of 26 to 27 degrees, which is only about half the list she formerly had. She is being patched and is much more buoyant than she has been and therefore more llkely to be damaged by heavy seas at the time of the high tides.

Additional blasting is being done today, temporary patches are being made on the vessel's bottom and side, pumps are being put aboard and she will be lightened so that it is expected she will come off easily tomorrow if the gale does not damage her in the meantime.

The plan is for the Salvage King to pull her off and then beach her in Pearl Harbor close by until she can be temporarily repaired.
