



### BIBLE SUNDAY IN CHURCHES

Local Organization Will Make Canvass of City in Interests of Society

Yesterday was known as Bible Sunday and the work of the Canadian Bible Society was presented to the congregations of the various churches in the city. In B.C. the society distributes thousands of copies of the Scriptures annually in English and foreign languages. The society and its parent organization in London prints and distributes the Scripture in 590 different languages and a new translation is given to the world at the rate of one every six weeks. Last year the parent society distributed more than 10 million copies of the Scriptures. It is interesting to note that prior to the formation of this great organization, the Scriptures were only known in about 100 languages and now it is read in nearly 600. The work is supported entirely by voluntary contributions and the proceeds of sales where
