United States Marines Take Part in a Little War Policing Nicaragua

BY HELP OF FIVE AIRPLANES THEY KILL ONE HUNDRED REBELS AND THUS DEFEATED MOVEMENT . OF SUNDINO

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, July 18 .- One United States marine was killed and another wounded in a fight with the forces of the Liberal General Sundino which attempted to capture the town of Ocotal. The battle was fierce as any in Nicaraguan history. It continued for 17 hours until Sundino and his followers numbering 480 armed with machine guns was badly beaten by the U.S. Marines numbering 39 and 47 members of the Nicaraguan constabulary.
