

TO BUILD SEINE BOAT

The McLean shipbuilding shop has been given a contract by the Langara Fishing Co. to construct a 48 x 12 seine boat, work on which will commence within one week. The vessel, which is to be ready this season for operation out of the company's cannery at Massett, will be powered with a 30 h.p. Imperial engine.

The McLean shop is making good time with the two seine boats it is building for the Gosse Packing Co. The first was launched last week and the second took to the water yesterday. There is of course most of the upper work to be done yet.

Granby Co. to replace the Azurite, sold last year to the Swanson interests here, is very nearly completed and within a short time will be turned over to the owners. This substantial and neat appearing vessel, 74½ feet long and powered with a 125 h.p. Washington-Estep engine, was doing unofficial trials in the harbor on Thursday afternoon, and apparently was turning over well. The heavy power gives all the speed that is required and perhaps some to spare. She will be one of the finest boats of her kind ever turned out by a local yard.

Tenders were being called this week for the repair of the forestry boat Alpine Fir which was badly shattered in a gasoline explosion aboard at Butedale two weeks ago. Survey of the vessel after she arrived here at the end of last week established that she was even more seriously damaged than was at first reported. The upper works were practically destroyed leaving but hull and engine intact. She is indeed a sorry sight and one would wonder how the chief engineer, who is reported to

be making rapid recovery in the Prince Rupert General Hospital from a broken ankle, arm and nose, got out of it with his life. Providence seems to have been kind to him in spite of the fact that, as it was, he was pretty badly slashed up.

Thursday afternoon's bright sunshine and balmy breeze, ushering in Prince Rupert's first genuine signs of spring, brought out most of the pleasure boat owners for anything from one to six hours labor on their craft at the Yacht Club floats. While Shef was kept busy on the hop here for a hammer, there a paint brush and all over the place for their various requirements, there was a session of cleaning and painting and wrestling with the gadgets.

George Arnold had his Nechako's hull painted, an operation that was long needed and much deferred. It was indeed a busy afternoon, assuring that beach parties will soon be the order of the day again.

Laurie Lambly, former skipper of the Salt Lake ferry "23," is now on the permanent staff of the dry dock. From the looks of things and judging from what we hear, Laurie is bravely contemplating even more permanent and serious responsibilities.

Two new halibut boats are nearing completion in Cow Bay and will shortly be ready for the high spots.

Finishing touches are being put on the Viking I, which has been built at the Suehiro establishment for Harold Erickson. The vessel is 45 feet long and is powered with a 20 h.p. Hein (Danish) engine. She will carry a crew of four men and it is expected she will get away about the end of next week.

The 32-foot boat of Mr. Garlick and son has been named Misty. A 10 h.p. Ivisan engine has been installed in the vessel which is also about ready to go.

Jeff Lambly and Joe Reid have returned to port after having spent the winter down the coast trapping with the "O Baby."

This year's total of landings here to date is considerably lower than last year's total of 3,783,300 pounds at a similar date but a period of such good weather has been prevailing this last week will considerably tend to bring up the current year's record.

Prices during the week were at a comparatively low level. The highest American price—14.8c and 7c—was paid on Saturday to the Uranus for 5,500 pounds and the Fremont, 10,000, while the lowest American bid of the week was 12c and 6c paid yesterday to the Eastern Point for a small catch of 2,200 pounds. IMPORTANT NOTICE

All Trades, Businesses and Professions must be registered before April 30th.

Notice is hereby given that, pursuant to sub-section (3) of Section 52B of the Taxation Act, every person who engages in, carries on, or practices any Trade, Business or Profession within the Province is required to obtain from the Commissioner of Income Tax a Certificate of Registration before April 30th, 1927. Application should be made to any Provincial Assessor, from whom full information may be obtained. Certificates will be issued without the payment of any fee therefor.

Default in complying with the provisions of this section renders the person liable, upon summary conviction, to a fine of \$10.00 for each day during which his default continues.

Application forms may be obtained from any Provincial Assessor, Government Agent, Provincial Police Officer, or from the Commissioner of Income Tax, Victoria, B.C.
