Davis Sensational With 23-Point Scoring Spree

Manson's Defences Weak

Gordon & Anderson 52; Mansons 35

Unerring long shots of Joe Davis and overpowering drive of Jimmie Flaten gave Gordon & Anderson a smashing 17-point victory that set last year champion Mansons on their heels in the 1952-53 senior league basketball opener Saturday night.

Dropping in sensational shots from nearly any point in the court with his familiar fall-away style, Davis brought back memories of earlier days of his shooting skill which racked up 23 points in the opener.

And Manson's defence was powerless against the combined drive of Flaten and Rupe Holstad as the former sank home 13 points—twice making long shots count a second before the end of a period to thrill some 300 first-nighters.

The duel fought in 8-minute quarters, however, had a rusty opening while players tried to find their range. Some of them found it after half-time; others just didn't.

Playing coach Don Hartwig of Mansons, fouling out in the last frame, found his team unable to cope with rebounds at their own, or the opposition hoop, and key defence work showed little organization.

Muscle-bulging centre Art Olson saw his favorite hook-shot missing time and again, while last year's starring hoopster Ray Spring found the mark for only nine points, but was high man for Mansons.

Showing good form were newcomers to the senior league this year, Ron Weber for G-As and Evans for the jewellers, Danny Bill for the losers sank home a triple of beauties from outside the key in the last half, while Hebb for the winners main-

tained solid defence with plenty of endurance.

Fred Calderoni and Ole Slatta as referees kept the games clean and moving along at a good pace.

Reason for the 8-minute length quarters, it was explained, was to keep the game within the hour-limit. Entire event got an action-by-action broadcast over CFR by sportscaster Mel Thompson.

Said Art Murray, basketball association president, after the game:

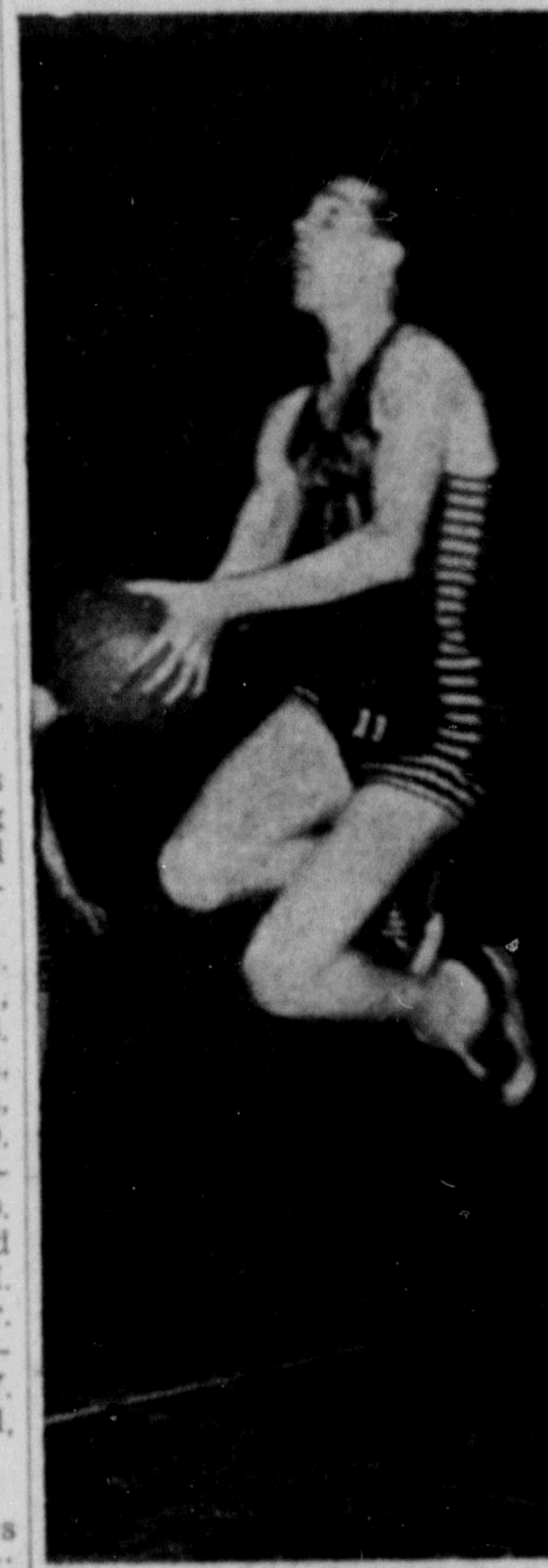

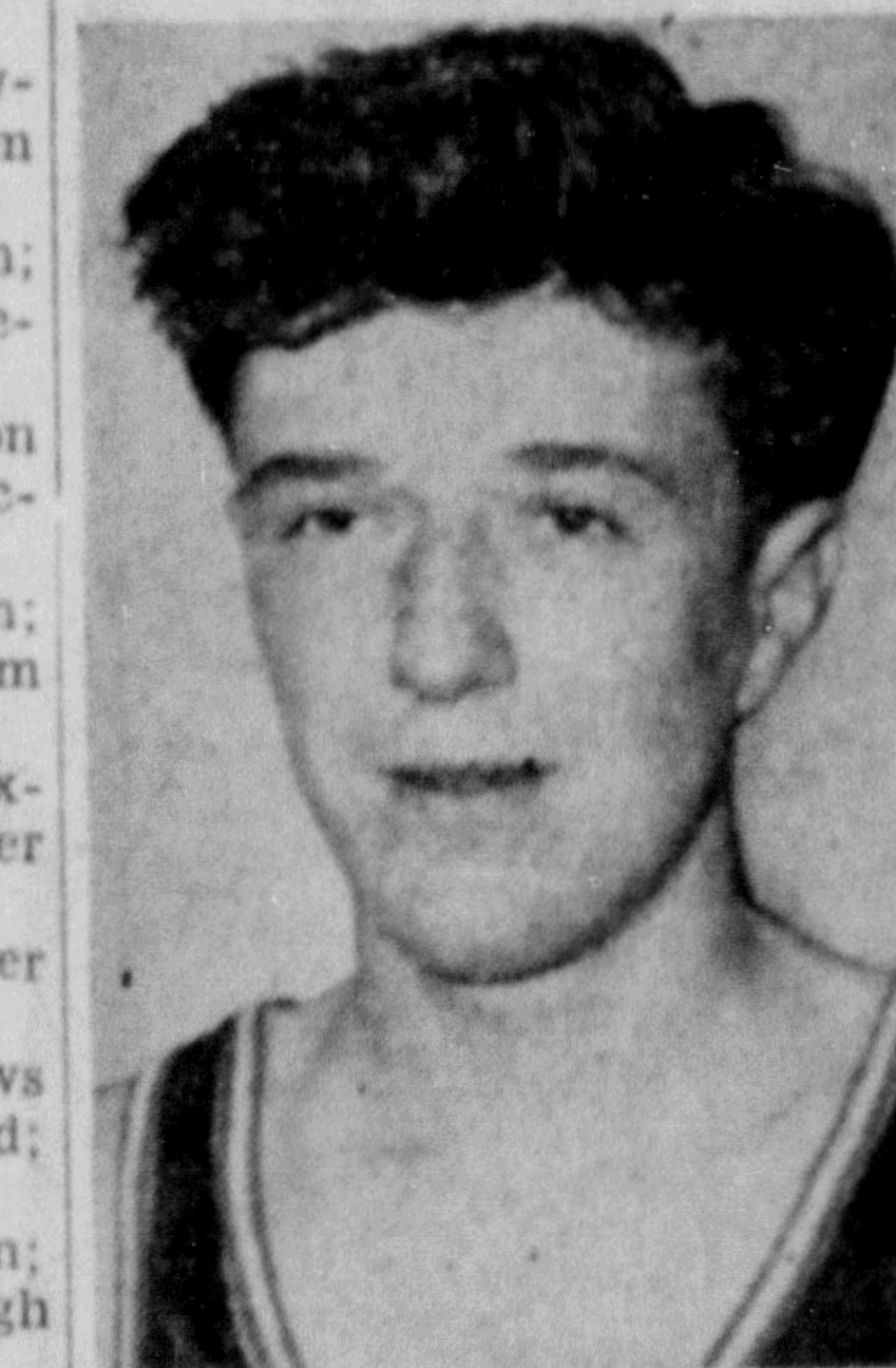

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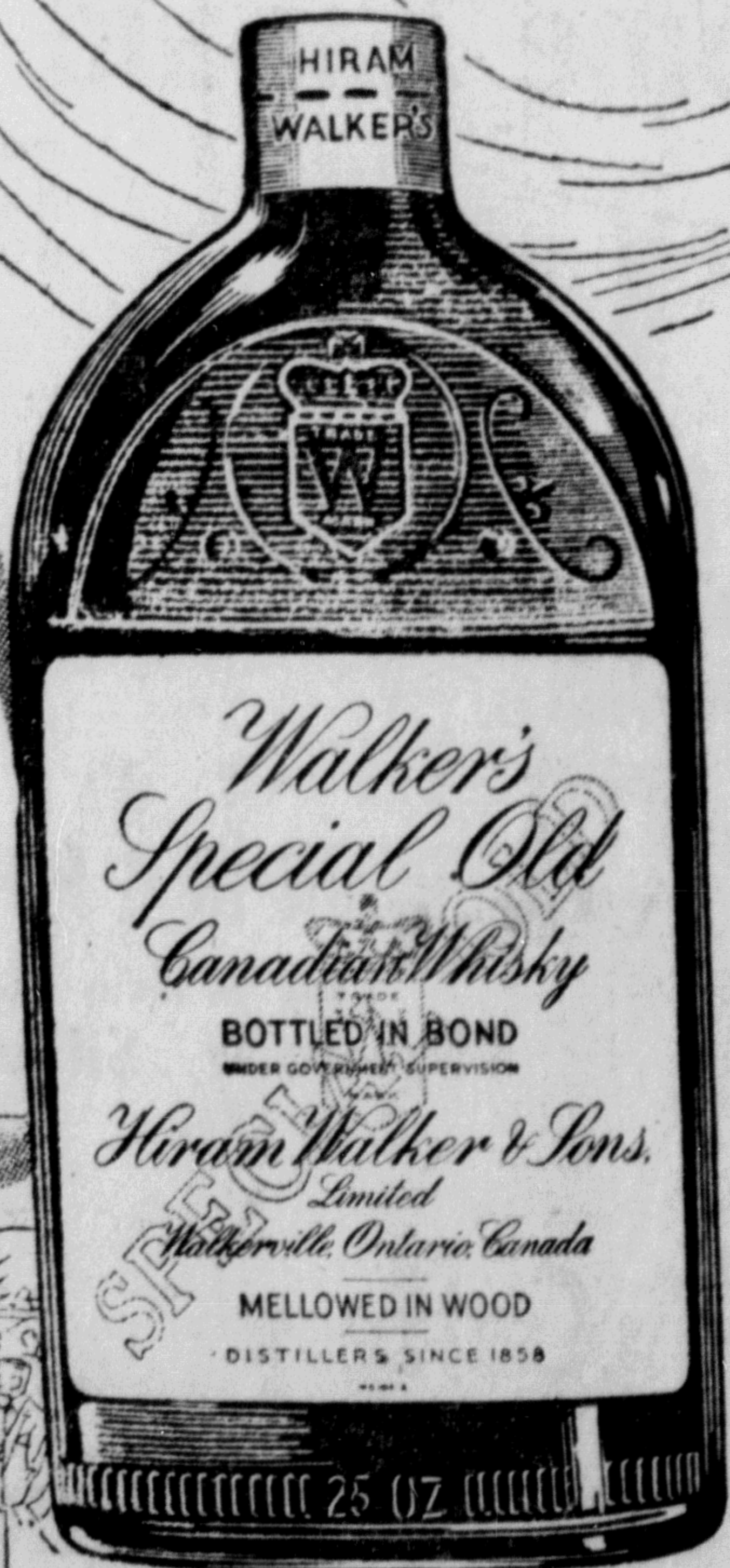
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
