

BRITISH STEAMER SEDGE POOL AR-RIVES TODAY TO LOAD FOR U.K. OR CONTINENT

To load a full cargo of grain for the United Kingdom or continent at the Wheat Pool's local elevator, the British freighter Sedge Pool arrived in port at o'clock this morning. The vessel is already lined but has a couple of feeders to be installed and, for that purpose and for fumigation, is today lying at the ocean dock. She is billed to go on berth

550,000 and 300,000 bushels. The vestel is registered at West Hartlepool, England, and is of 3367 tons. Captain Robert Prideaux is her master and there is a crew of 36 men. The vessel coaled at Union Bay and cleared there on April 16 for Prince Rupert.


