DR. TURPEL SPEAKS AT TERRACE P.T.A.

Gave Interesting Address at Regular Meeting of Organization Last Week

TERRACE, April 19.—The regular monthly meeting of the Parent-Teachers' Association was held in the school house on Thursday evening, Mrs. Dover presiding.

After the business meeting talks were rendered by Rev. A. W. Robinson and Rev. Wm. Allen and Dr. Turpel gave an interesting and instructive talk on a number of topics, contingent with good health. He used blackboard illustrations to stress the necessity of healthy teeth, tonsils, adenoids, glands, care with coitre, etc. He cited statistics in connection with the medical examination of the local school pupils and impressed the necessity of parents fostering good health habits in their children.

He also spoke on preventative measures used for infectious diseases and explained the system of vaccination, use of serum, etc., and urged that any probable infectious diseases be at once reported.

A number of those present availed themselves of the opportunity given at the close of the address to ask questions and these were satisfactorily answered by the speaker. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered Dr. Turpel and the vocalists and a social half hour was then spent while refreshments were served.
