

#### SEASONABLE RECIPES

Black Cherry Pudding

One cup milk, 1 cup cream, 5 tablespoons butter, 3-4 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind, 1-2 teaspoon grated nutmeg, 1-4 teaspoon powdered cloves, 4 eggs, 1 cup sifted dried bread

crumbs, 1 quart black cherries. Heat milk and cream and add butter. Beat yolk of eggs well with sugar, spices and lemon rind. Slowly add hot milk mixture, stirring to dissolve sugar. Add crumbs and cherries with pits removed. Mix well and fold in whites of eggs beaten until stiff and dry. Turn into a buttered baking dish. Place on several thicknesses of paper in a pan of hot water letting water come half way up on the dish. Bake in a moderate oven until firm to the touch, about forty minutes. Serve with slightly sweetened
