## HOLOCAUST WHILE FATHER BEING MARRIED THIRD TIME

## Effect of Earthquake Palestine Terrifying; Many Lives Were Lost

CAIRO, Egypt, July 12.—Eye witnesses arriving by airplane rom Trans-Jordania say it is believed that three hundred people were killed in yesterday's big earthquake. At Maan, Arabia, most of the houses were damaged or collapsed. The earth movements lasted for forty seconds and the effects were terrifying. Many were killed in Amman, Palestine, at Rudd and Ramleh. No damage was done in Cairo although the quake was felt here.

JERUSALEM, July 12.—An incomplete casualty list of yesterday's quake victims in the Jerusalem district gives 26 dead and 30 \*injured. Officials fear the casualties will yet be reported larger.
