

AIR TRAGEDY IN MANITOBA MYSTERY

HOLOCAUST WHILE FATHER BEING MARRIED THIRD TIME

Effect of Earthquake Palestine Terrifying; Many Lives Were Lost

CAIRO, Egypt, July 12.—Eye witnesses arriving by airplane from Trans-Jordan say it is believed that three hundred people were killed in yesterday's big earthquake. At Maan, Arabia, most of the houses were damaged or collapsed. The earth movements lasted for forty seconds and the effects were terrifying. Many were killed in Amman, Palestine, at Rudd and Ramleh. No damage was done in Cairo although the quake was felt here.

JERUSALEM, July 12.—An incomplete casualty list of yesterday's quake victims in the Jerusalem district gives 26 dead and 30 injured. Officials fear the casualties will yet be reported larger.

The comparatively solid building of the city saved the casualties from being larger. Intense alarm was felt by the people who thronged the streets.

Ninety houses in Abudja, Bethany, crumbled, and it is feared there were many victims. It is unofficially reported that 30 were killed and 250 injured at Nablus. A hotel collapsed in Jericho, killing three. Four were killed at the Mount of Olives.

Gaza, Acre and Beersheba are intact but Safad and Tiberias were slightly affected. Casualties are reported from more than twenty towns and villages.

REV. T. D. RINDE IS LEAVING FOR SOUTH

Rev. T. D. Rinde, at present pastor of the Lutheran Church in Prince Rupert, has accepted a call to Verdon, Nebraska, and expects to leave for his new field on Monday, August 1. No successor has been appointed yet but it is expected that the new minister will arrive early in September.

Mr. Rinde has had a very successful ministry here as the first permanent pastor of the Lutheran Church in Prince Rupert.

CHINESE GUNBOAT TURNED PIRATE BUT BEEN RECAPTURED

CANTON, July 12.—The Chinese gunboat Kongkoo, which turned pirate and seized several vessels; has been recaptured and the mutineers have been sentenced to be executed.

DRUNKEN PASSENGERS CAUSED PLANE SMASH

SEATTLE, July 12.—A coroner's jury yesterday found Pilot Johnson and three passengers who were killed in an airplane crash here on July 5, came to their death on account of the drunken condition of the passengers. They found that the pilot was sober and competent.

RIVER FERRY IS PROPOSED

Suggestion Made to Minister Yesterday May Speed Communication

A suggestion was made to Hon. Dr. Sutherland yesterday by a local resident which was given consideration by the minister and which might for a time solve the problem of transportation between Prince Rupert and Terrace so that the road might be opened within a reasonable time and without so very great cost to the province. The suggestion is that as soon as the road reaches Skeena City a ferry should be put on the Skeena River to carry cars and passengers past the bad portion of the road to connect up a few miles farther inland. This the minister thought might be a good thing. It would be only temporary but it would give the people here and in the interior an opportunity to use the through road quicker than otherwise would be the case.

ANOTHER VICTIM OF FIRE IN VANCOUVER BRINGS TOTAL TO 8

VANCOUVER, July 12.—William Harper, a Vancouver broker, died as the result of injuries sustained in the Royal Alexandra fire, raising the total victims to eight.

Following testimony given at the opening of the inquiry yesterday as to the effect of the paint remover used on the floor where the blaze originated which was highly inflammable, Fire Marshal Thomas ordered it withdrawn from sale in Vancouver.

Speaking of the celebration of the event connected with the Jubilee of Confederation, Mr. Pattullo said that the demonstration that was provided in Prince Rupert would do honor to many places of very much greater size than the Northern port. LIMITATION NAVAL COSTS HUGE SAVING



Children Burned to Death as Man Was Being Married to His Third Wife at Whitby, Ontario

OTTAWA, July 12.—Four Lacombe children were burned to death when fire destroyed their home at Wilno, Ontario. The dead are Alice, 11 years of age; Belle, 9; Edna, 7; and Isadore, 5. Yvonne, 18 years of age, is near death as a result of injuries received from jumping after a vain attempt to save the others.

Early in the morning Joseph Lacombe started for the town of Whitby to be married to his third wife. He was accompanied by his daughter Elizabeth and his son John, leaving the others asleep. An hour later, at the exact time the father was being married, Yvonne, who was to have been married herself next week, rose and replenished the fire and went out to feed the chickens. While outside she saw smoke issuing from one of the bedroom windows. She rushed in and endeavored to wake her sisters and brothers who were overcome by the smoke. Worst Air Tragedy in History Manitoba When Three Members of Survey Party Were Killed

Head of One Man Was Buried in Ground and One Wore Parachute: Debris of Machine Was Scattered

WINNIPEG, July 12.—Investigation is under way today of what is considered to be the worst airplane tragedy in the history of the province.

Pilot W. C. Weaver of Metfort, Sask., A. T. Herdley and F. H. Wrong were killed at Fairford, Manitoba, yesterday afternoon, when they fell a thousand feet in an unexplainable manner from a plane. They were members of the Manitoba aerial photographic survey party.

The opinion is expressed here that the plane was struck by lightning.

The body of one of the victims was found buried in the ground. The other two were nearby, one with a parachute on, which apparently he had no time to handle.

The debris of the machine was scattered over a wide area.

CITY ASKING FOR FLOATS

Accommodation for Fishermen on Waterfront Apparently Not on Program

The city council at their regular meeting last evening decided to communicate with the Provincial and Dominion authorities asking that immediate action be taken in regard to work on the fishery floats at Cow Bay. After the regular business, Mayor Newton brought up the matter stating that while there had been much talk and even a sum of \$15,000 mentioned in connection with work on the fishery floats, he had been unable to get any definite information that work would be done this year. Unless it was started at once the fall storms would be here again and as last year, the boats would be without protection.

While \$15,000 had been mentioned in the supplementary estimates of the Dominion House yet even the local member was not able to say that the work would be undertaken this fall. Mr. Brady had made a strong appeal before adjournment but nothing had been accomplished.

The council agreed that now was the time to act and the city clerk was instructed to write both the Provincial and Dominion authorities.
