DOMINION DAY CELEBRATED IN TERRACE TOWN

Every Feature on Ambitious Program Was Successful

TERRACE, July 5.—Clear skies and bright warm sunshine ushered in Dominion Day in Terrace and as befitted the occasion the most pretentious celebration ever attempted here was carried out most successfully. Never before has so much enthusiasm been shown in preparation for a holiday. Many artistic decorative effects were carried out or streets, stores and private homes. All manner of vehicles from tricycles to logging trucks were decorated for the parade. While large quantities of bunting, flags, etc., were stocked in readiness for the event, there was a decided shortage, and considerable disappointment in this regard.

From early morning young girls were selling attractive programs of the day's sports with tag flags attached. This was a means used to assist in Tinancing the celebration and met with a ready and liberal response from the public gener-

The day's program commenced at ten o'clock at the Bank Square where a very large crowd of people had gathered. Directed by Rev. Wm. Allan, and with Mrs. Von Hees as accompanist, the school children very heartily sang "O Canada." Exercises by the newly formed boy scout brigade and a flag drill by the C.G.I.T. unit, under the directorship of Miss Toombs, were very well performed and received much applause. Both these were awarded special prizes.




