Here are five uncommon recipes for dishes to please lagging appetites during hot weather.

Their daintiness, as well as their food values, makes them very desirable at this season, and you will find them particularly enjoyable because of the savoury tang of Colman's Mustard. Clip these recipes for future reference.

APRICOT SALAD AND DRESSING

4 egg yolks beaten; 4 tablespoons vinegar; 1 teaspoon butter; 1 teaspoon salt; 1 teaspoon Colman's Mustard; 1 tablespoon sugar; 1 little red pepper:

Mix together in double boiler, and cook five minutes. After it begins to thicken, stir constantly. When cool add 1 cup whipped cream, twelve marshmallows cut fine, and 1/2 cup cut pecans. Drain 1 can of apricots arrange halves on lettuce leaves and serve with above dressing. This recipe serves eight people.

DEVILLED EGG SALAD

6 hard boiled eggs; 11/2 teaspoons butter; 1 teaspoon cream; 2 tablespoons vinegar; scant teaspoon Colman's Mustard; pinch cayenne; 1/4 teaspoon salt:

Split the eggs lengthwise, remove the yolks. To the yolks add the other ingredients and mix to form a paste. Refill the whites and serve on lettuce leaves with mayonnaise.

This may be varied by adding 1/2 cup minced ripe olives or 2 tablespoons tomato sauce and 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce.

DEVILLED CHEESE CRACKERS

11/2 cups diced moist cheese; 1 teaspoon Colman's Mustard; 2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce; 2 tablespoons butter; 1 tablespoon vinegar; 4 teaspoon salt; 1/8 teaspoon cayenne:

Beat the cheese with the seasonings and flavorings until light and creamy. Spread on toasted crackers and serve with salads. This will spread about fifty crackers.

SPINACH SALAD

1 pint boiled spinach; 2 tablespoons oil; 1 tablespoon vinegar; 1/2 teaspoon Colman's Mustard; salt; pepper:

Add seasoning to oil and vinegar and mix with spinach. Pack lightly in six moulds to cool. Place a slice of cold ham on young lettuce leaves and on each slice turn a mould of spinach. Garnish with slices of cold boiled egg. Serve with French or mayonnaise dres-

PEANUT BUTTER SANDWICH

1/2 cup peanut butter; 1/2 cup chopped pickle; teaspoon Colman's Mustard; 3 tablespoons hot water; 1/4 teaspoon salt: Beat all ingredients together until light. Spread between slices of either white or whole wheat bread.
