#### MANITOBA AGAINST PICTURES IN SCHOOL

Winnipeg Refused to Accept War Scenes from I.O.D.E. Says Secretary

WINNIPEG, July 8. - (Canadian .548 Press) .- "We have had a hard time in .545 the placing of war memorial pictures in .542 the schools in Manitoba," stated Miss .532 W. Gordon, of Kingston, Ont., National .459 Educational secretary of the I.O.D.E. .411 when asked if all pictures allotted to

the various provinces had been placed. "The authorities throughout Manitoba have a strong feeling against the placing of war pictures in the schools, owing to their influence upon the children," she continued. "In Winnipeg the school board has not permitted any to be hung, whereas in the other provinces the governments in many cases have assisted in carrying out this phase of our memorial work by either framing the pictures or helping in the trans-

portation. "Manitcha students have done very well indeed in the obtaining of bursary scholarships," Miss Gordon claimed, "and the University of Manitoba has been especially good in remitting fees.

"In 1938, the war memorial work will be completed, as we have figured that by that time the soldiers' children will be beyond college age. Sixty-five tursaries and 36 scholarships have been awarded over a period of seven years and we have received roughly between \$17,000 and \$18,000 toward the memorial fund this year, which leaves us \$35,000 short of what we hope to ac complish."

## PROVINCIAL ELECTION IS

Matter Discussed at Capital and Will be Before Cabinet Next Week

VICTORIA, July 8 .- The death of Dr. Rothwell, Liberal member for New Westminster in the Legislature, has again revived the possibility of a provincial general election. The matter it is understood will be discussed by the government next week and a definite decision arrived at.

It is thought that the present time may be an auspicious one for a general election as the government stands well throughout the country and supporters of the administration feel sure of it being again returned, should an appeal be taken now.

It is possible that Premier Oliver may retire before the election takes place and that the cabinet will be reorganized under a new premier, but who that premier is to be is scarcely suggested. The choice seems to lie between Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, Hon. A. M. Manson, attorney general, and Dr. McLean, minister of finance, who has been acting premier during the absence of Mr. Oliver.

CARLISLE, England, July 8 .- J. H. Thomas, general secretary of the National Union of Railwaymen, addressing a conference of members of that body said: "I hope Russia will immediately abandon the absurd idea that she can engineer a revolution in this country or dictate in a movement like ours how we are going to conduct our

"It is no secret," Mr. Thomas said, "that Russian money has been used in subsidizing their propaganda, but the mistake the Rusians are making is in subsidizing the wrong people. Neither the minority movement nor the communist propaganda is going to divert the great mass of the workers of this country from following the constitutional path to bring about the social changes required."
