FESTIVITIES TURN TO MOURNING FOR AMERICAN FLYER

Flight of Commander Byrd and Companions Was Arduous Passage

FOG, LOW CLOUDS, DARKNESS, DRIVING RAIN AND FAULTY COMPASS CAUSED, FAILURE WITH GOAL PRACTICALLY IN SIGHT

PARIS, July 4.—During the entire time the plane America was flying over the Atlantic Ocean, there was no glimpse caught of the water on account of fog and low clouds. This, combined with darkness, driving rain and a faulty earth induction compass, resulted in the navigators losing their way when they reached the coast of France, where they made a forced landing in the water.

Commander Byrd, head of the four-man expedition, estimated that he had travelled 4,200 miles when he was forced down. It was 42 hours after they had left New York that the landing was made. * The ship was shocked and bruised in the
