SHIPPING CAR LOAD OF ORE

Mine Near Kalum Lake Has Thirty Tons on Dump Awaiting Snow

TERRACE, Nov. 11.-Black Wolf Mining Company of Kalum Lake has thirty tons of rich highgrade ore on the dump ready for shipment to Trail smelter and snow is now awaited in order to get it to the railway at Terrace. Assay returns show that this ore goes \$160 to the ton of zinc, silver and lead. There is about six inches in the vein of high grade and three feet of good milling ore, the only difficulty is the matter of transportation. A mill would have to be put in before large shipments could

The present cost of producing the high grade is \$20 a ton for mining. \$20 for getting it to the railway and approximately \$15 a. ton for freight to Trail. This makes a total of \$35 a ton, leaving a net profit on the operation of about \$105 a ton.

With more modern methods of mining and better transportation these costs could be very materially reduced.

Cross of Sacrifice Unveiled Washington by Col. Ralston Presence of Vast Concourse

WASHINGTON, November 11.—In the presence of a vast concourse thronging the enclosure near the tomb of the American unknown soldier in Arlington cemetery, a gathering representing the civil and official life of the two great nations of North America paid the tribute of Canada to the citizens of the United States who died in the Canadian army when the cross of sacrifice, the gift of the Canadian people, was unveiled by Colonel Hon. J. L. Ralston.

"Through days to come may the two nations never forget the spirit of this moment or lose sight of the glory of this cross, our reward, pledge of brotherhood, and symbol of the tellowship of the faithful even unto death," Colonel Ralston said.

Dr. King also took part and later laid a wreath on the tomb of the unknown soldier.

HOMAGE PAID BY THE KING TO WAR DEAD

Almost Endless Procession Files Past Cenotaph and Marches to Abbey

LONDON, Nov. 11 .- The King and Royal Family paid homage to the war dead at the cenotaph in Whitehall today. For two minutes after Big Ben sounded eleven, the city was like a great cathedral.

From the balcony of the government building Queen Mary joined in the singing of "O God Our Help in Ages Past," which opened the service conducted by the Bishop of

Then the King, the Prince of Wales, and the Duke of York each placed a wreath at the base of the cenotaph, starting a seemingly endless procession past the monument. The marchers continued to the grave of the unknown soldier in Westminster Abbey.

OTTAWA, November 11.-Nine years ago today saw Canadian soldiers fighting the last battle of the war, delivering the Belgian city of Mons from the German army. At Ottawa this afternoon a ceremony took place in Victory Tower when Premier Mackenzie King and members of his cabinet, premiers of the nine provinces and other notable figures including Hon. William Phillips, American minister to Canada, assembled in the memorial chamber. Following a brief service the premier and Mr. Phillips each laid a wreath on the altar.
