

Hyder Banker Addresses Club on Portland Canal Country and Its Possibilities

addressed the Rotary Club their longhous resternan afternoon on Portland Camil district and its mining possibilities. Mr. Hall is a Hyder banker who is just moving from Hyder to Vancouver to deal in Portland Canal properties. He has been in close touch with the situation at the mines for a number of years and his address; proved very interesting.

Mr. Hall said that on the American side they had only one mine so far, the Riverside, but there were a large number of good looking properties that would be developed. The mill at the Riverside was closed just now but more ore would be developed and work would

Speaking of the different properties active in the district Mr. Hall touched on the Premier, which was still paying 32 per cent dividends divided into eight per cent quarterly, 26,000,000 gross having been taken out so far.

The entrance of the Consolidated into the district caused elation and other big companies were looking over the ground with a view to entering the field. The George property was being drilled and showings were very good and they believed the Big Missouri would be the biggest mine in the district. The Woodbine adjoining the Premier had developed a lot of ore.

In regard to Dunwell, there was a report that new ore had been discovered and that the mill would not shut down. There was more ore and of better

The Porter Idaho and Prosperity came

in for remarks. Mr. Hall said the people of the district felt they had just turned the corner and that a number of big mines would be opened up. It was no poor man's country as it took capital and time to make a mine there. It had been said that Portland Canal was the most likely looking mining country in the world today except perhaps the Rand. Prince Rupert, he felt sure, would benefit from the development of the district. It was a young man's country, there being no other like it.

Mr. Hall touched lightly on his hydro-electric scheme for the mines of the district and said they would proceed as soon as the demand was great
