**KING BOOK**

could not remain if his action in the U.N. was repudiated. . . .  
"On learning this King was incredulous. He had expected no more rebellions in the last illustrious months of his reign. Dingle had always been brittle of course and had never pretended to like his leader, but St. Laurent was not only King's closest colleague but the man already chosen to succeed him. . . ."  
But the prime minister "capitulated" at a private dinner with Mr. St. Laurent at Laurier House after the latter had said that "naturally he must resign if King repealed his policy," and the prime minister had replied that resignation was unthinkable.  
"This affair, so carefully hushed-up, marked a watershed in the political lives of King and St. Laurent," Mr. Hutchison writes. "King was no longer the dominant power in government. He was too old to fight. St. Laurent, the rising man, had challenged and beaten him."  
In a different vein the book describes "the comic side" of Mackenzie King's obsession with the danger of Communism. It apparently came from a conversation with the prime minister after the 1946 espionage trials.  
"One of his servants, said King, was a Communist, probably a spy, and this man he watched with continual amusement. To draw him out King would talk at length about the virtues of Communism, pretending a warm sympathy for Russia . . . actually it was nonsense but King enjoyed his little game of hide-and-seek."  
Mr. Hutchison accepts as true published reports of Mackenzie King's conferences with spiritualists and that he died believing he had communed with the dead, including his mother and President Roosevelt.  
This intriguing story of Mackenzie King follows the bachelor politician from his birth Dec. 17, 1874, in Kitchener (then Berlin) Ont., to his lonely death at Kingsmere on the evening of July 22, 1950, after an illness that had weakened and wracked him through the last two years of his life.  
Mr. Hutchison also writes of the king's religious faith and his devotion to his family, including his wife, Elizabeth, and their four children: Margaret, Yvette, Roland, and Arthur, all of this city.

**Sometimes Change to Lower Ranking Suit Is in Order**

When your partner opens the bidding, what do you need to respond with a bid of two in a lower ranking suit? In today's deal Mrs. Keen had ample trump support for her partner's hearts. But her hand was too strong for a single heart raise. Even so, she wouldn't have liked this latter bid without a holding of at least four hearts.

In this situation she made the best bid available—two diamonds. Her next bid of three hearts completed the story she wanted to tell. To make a two over one response, you need about the equal of an average hand in high cards. With a singleton or void in partner's bid suit, it is well to have a little more.

Against the final contract of four hearts Mr. Abel opened the nine of spades. The 10 was played from the board and Mr. Dale won with the queen, cashed the ace and led a third spade which was taken with dummy's king.
