

London Team Fails to Win and Coveted Soccer Trophy Leaves Home First Time in History

LONDON, April 23 .- The English Football Association Cup moves out of England for the first time in its long history as a result of the victory of Cardiff City by one to nothing over Arsenal, a London team, in the final for the coveted trophy at Wembley today. The winning goal was scored after twenty-eight minutes of play in the second half. More than 150,000 madly enthusiastic fans witnessed the struggle. King George was one of the spectators and he received a tremendous ovation from the Welsh supporters who entertained him with community singing, the crowd standing with heads uncovered as "Abide With Me" was sung.
