

GIRLS MUST WEAR DRESSES TO SHOE TOPS ITALY TODAY

ROME. July 23.-Long skirts for little girls is the newest battle-cry of Italy's :00 per cent dress reformers who insist that the innate innocence of childhood toes not constitute an excuse for immodestly abbreviated dresses. Teachers at Bologna have been instructed to refuse entrance to classes of children whose parents failed to heed the admonition that skirts of all Italian girls must be worn below the shoetops.

The Bishop of Piacenza, one of the leaders of the dress reform, has issued an announcement that rising temperature must not be used as justification by women for immodest dressing. No matter what the temperature may be, the prelate asserts, women must wear long sleeves and cover their necks, the clergy having been ordered to refuse cacraments to those "immodestly clad."
