DRASTIC MEASURES TAKEN IRELAND

BIG FIRE IN VANCOUVER CAUSES EXCITEMENT IN CITY

Cosgrave Government Asks Drastic Powers of Dail in Emergency

Death of Hon. Kevin O'Higgins results in changes of law to apply to present situation

DUBLIN, July 23.—The terms of the Public Safety Bill introduced into the Dail by President Cosgrave Wednesday to meet the situation created by the death of Vice-president Kevin O'Higgins and the general hostility of the Republicans to the Free State, were made public last night. The bill gives the Government very drastic powers in an emergency as follows:

1. To declare a state of emergency at any time, to establish military courts to try certain offenses.
2. To deport any citizen belonging to an illegal organization.
3. To suppress any unconstitutional publications.
4. To suppress illegal organizations.
5. To extend the death penalty to persons convicted of concealing arms.

Yesterday the leadership changed hands for the fifth time in just five days.

In the American League upsets were the rule Friday. Of the three games played, one was lost by the league leading Yankees and the other two by the Senators.

PRINCE SAILED CANADIAN TOUR

Other well known passengers on the same boat are Albert Barry, who rows against Major Goodsell at Vancouver on Labor Day; Hon. Randolph Bruce, Lieutenant Governor of British Columbia; Hon. Robert Forke, minister of Immigration, and Mr. Justice Duff of Ottawa.

PRESENT FARM PRINCE GEORGE

Subscriptions Being Raised to Purchase Fronde Farm For His Royal Highness

VICTORIA, July 23.—The associated boards of trade of Vancouver Islands are sponsoring a scheme for contributing to a fund for the purpose of presenting Prince George with a ranch known as Fronde Farm at Cobble Hill. The present is to be made by the city of Victoria and other island municipalities by public subscription.

LUMBER COMMISSIONERS APPOINTED TO PRESS SALE OF WOOD PRODUCTS

VICTORIA, July 23.—Pressing the sale of British Columbia wood products in Eastern Canada, M. M. Little of the lands department has been appointed lumber trade commissioner with headquarters at Toronto. J. T. Lynde is named assistant commissioner.

CHARGED MURDER OF CHARLES JURY

TRAIL, B.C., July 23.—Kenneth Bailey, charged with the murder of Charles Jury, was brought here from Okalla and remanded until July 29 by Magistrate Macdonald in the police court. He was taken to the jail at Nelson.

AUCKLAND, July 23.—The Canadian All-Stars defeated New Zealand representative team in a test match here this afternoon.

Fire Destroyed Part of Vancouver Lumber Mill; Planing Mill is Saved

VANCOUVER, July 23.—Fire swept a portion of the plant of the Alberta Lumber Mills here last night and destroyed the dry kiln and storage sheds. The lumber loss alone is estimated to exceed \$100,000.

Sparks from a burner in another nearby mill in the False Creek industrial area are believed to have started the blaze, which broke out shortly after the workmen left Friday.

Attracted by the belching of clouds of black smoke and spectacular flames, thousands of people swarmed around the scene from all parts of the city.

Hampered by a breeze from the northwest which drove acrid smoke and hot blasts in their faces, the firemen at first fought a losing battle but eventually succeeded in controlling the fire two hours after it was discovered.

More than one hundred employees played the company's hose on the space between the blaze and a \$600,000 planing mill, which was saved.

LOCAL BOY IS WINNER BIG PRIZE

KILLED BANDIT HAND TO HAND

BEETON, Ont., July 23.—Alex. Hodges, a bachelor farmer, according to his own admission, killed an unknown man in a hand-to-hand fight in the darkness in the farm kitchen after a wild struggle with the bandit.

GERMAN WARSHIP RAISED AT ORKNEYS

STROMNESS, Orkney Islands, July 23.—One of the greatest salvage feats in the world has been completed with the raising of the 23,000-ton German battle cruiser Moltke, which was scuttled at Scapa Flow. It is the largest vessel ever salvaged and will be broken up on the beach at Cava Island, a quarter of a mile from where the ship lay immersed in 70 feet of water for eight years.

ARCHDEACON LEFT TODAY

Will Make Effort to Collect Remainder of Sum Needed for Bishopric

Archdeacon Rix, administrator of the diocese of Calidonia and Rector of Prince Rupert, left this morning for a three months tour of the east in an effort to raise from twelve to fifteen thousand dollars now needed to complete the sum necessary for the endowment of the bishopric here before a bishop will be appointed. He will lay the claims of the church here before congregations in Toronto, Ontario and Quebec dioceses and will then attend the meeting of the general synod of the Church at Kingston in September.

SALMON FISHING IS SPOTTY THIS SEASON

That is Statement of One of Skeena River Cannermen Who Was in City

Salmon fishing is very spotty this season, said a canneryman who was in from the Skeena River yesterday. It is improving, but still it is good in one spot and poor in another and it is impossible to tell where the fish are likely to be. One boat will get perhaps one hundred fish and another several times that number.

AMERICAN HORSE FOR GRAND NATIONAL

CHICAGO, July 23.—Burgoright, owned by Benjamin Leslie Behr, Chicago sportsman, and bred in the United States, is to be sent to England next March to compete in the Grand National Steeplechase. No American-bred horse ever has won the historic race.

ANOTHER MISING LINK IS FOUND IN AFRICA BY UNIVERSITY

Skeleton of Child Said to Have Lived in Last Glacial Epoch

CHICAGO, Ill., July 23.—The skeleton of a child, found in Mochta-el-Arbi, Algeria, by Dr. Alonso W. Pond of Beloit University, is believed to have belonged to a race hitherto unknown and living in the last glacial epoch.

Prof. Fay Cooper Cole of the University of Chicago, who is studying the odd skeleton, said it does not conform closely to the Neanderthal or Cro-Magnon which were known to have been in Europe or Northern Africa in late glacial times.

The skeleton is very well preserved, and shows a child with a short head, a good cranial development, wide skull bones and a strong chin. Viewed from above, the skull is pear shaped. The exact geological age of the skeleton cannot be determined. Prof. Cole said, until the bones of animals and skeletons of land snails, as well as implements found with it, are studied.

Dr. George L. Collie, professor of Anthropology at Beloit, will join an expedition in Algeria next autumn in an attempt to procure more data to prove his theory that Africa was the birthplace of mankind.

SON OF NOVELIST SENT TO PRISON FOR USING FUNDS

INVESTIGATE IRRIGATION

THREE YEARS PENITENTIARY

VANCOUVER, July 23.—Convicted of obtaining by false pretences \$6,380 from Mrs. Annie Birkett, Arthur Lomas, former Burnaby councillor, was sentenced in the county court today by Judge Ruggles to three years' imprisonment in New Westminster penitentiary.

ALASKA TO PUGET SOUND IN 26 FOOT BOAT IS REPORTED

SAN FRANCISCO, July 23.—Army headquarters here received today the report of a trip from Chilkoot barracks, Alaska, to Puget Sound in a 26-foot boat accomplished by Captain Malcolm Grow and Private R. G. Ray.

ALASKA TO PUGET SOUND IN 26 FOOT BOAT IS REPORTED

The distance is estimated in the army report at 1300 miles and the voyage required fifteen days. Grow was assigned to duty at Camp Lewis, Washington, and chose a small motorboat in preference to travelling on the steamer.
