## HEARS WITH HIS FINGERS

Demonstration Given of Attainments of Youth Who Lost Ears and Eyes

NEW YORK, July 23.—Through highly sensitized fingers that serve him in place of ears, Winthrop Clark Chapman, of Redfield, S.D., made deaf and blind by spinal meningitis eight years ago, "heard" and replied to speakers at the recent annual meeting of the Society of Progressive Oral Advocates.

The youth demonstrated his attainment with Miss Sophie Alcorn, his teacher at the state school for the deaf at Sioux Falls, S.D. He received the words by placing his fingers against the side of his teacher's face, on her chin, on her neck, on the back of her neck or over the end of a small megaphone. He also "heard" by merely placing his hand before the speaker's face.

The boy has a 2,000-word vocabulary. Although unable to hear his own voice, he both spoke and sang. He is a member of his school dramatic association and is active in athletics.

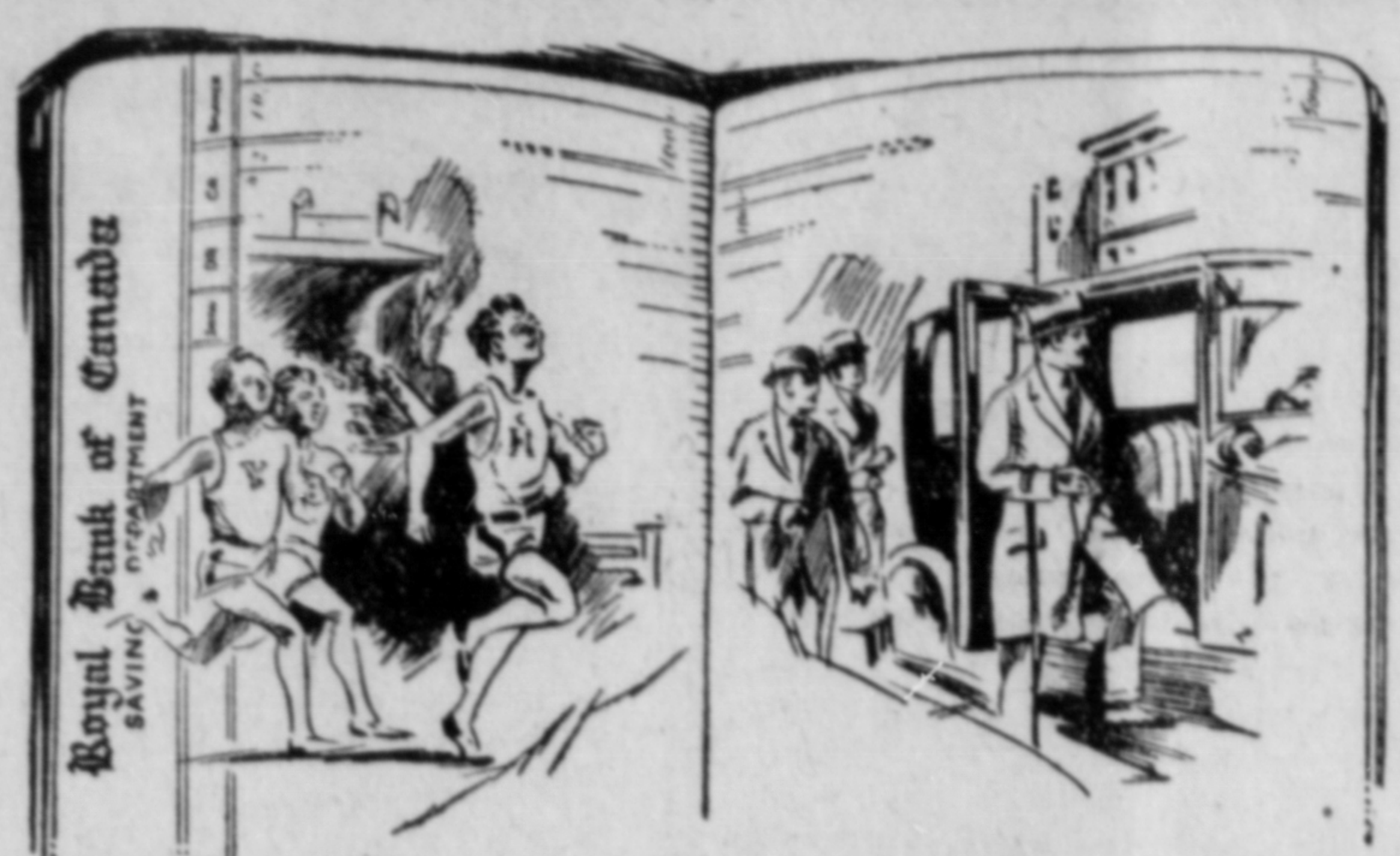

## SPIDER FARMS LATEST THING

X-Rays Showing Way to Many Commercial Improvements Scientists Say

FRENCH LICK, Ind., July 23.—X-Rays are opening the eyes of the world to new fields of invention and fortune, Dr. George L. Clark, founder of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology's industrial X-ray research laboratory, declaring before the American Society for Testing Materials convention here recently.

"Industry's newest tool, the x-ray, until recently only known in hospital and academic laboratories, already is amazing its new employers," said Dr. Clark. "Just recently x-rays showed that spiders and silkworms spin exactly the same kind of fibre and immediately set United States manufacturers to consider establishment of spider farms."

"Prohibition agents in California are using x-rays to detect liquor in suspected packages. The British army uses the x-ray to examine wood in its aeroplanes for cracks, worm holes and knots. Boston stores have x-ray devices showing customers how their feet fit into shoes. And an Ohio dairy farm recently engaged to use x-rays to find size and location of holes in Swiss cheese."

"One golf ball maker has increased sales 200 per cent by advertising the fact that x-rays prove the symmetry of his golf ball centres."

Dr. Clark said that steel rail "caking, along a mystery, seems close to solution through x-ray observation. Iridium, new element recently discovered at the University of Illinois, was found because x-rays could reveal unknown substances, Dr. Clark reported.

**INFERIORITY COMPLEX**  
NEW YORK, July 23.—The inferiority complex of some college students is being studied by the Rockefeller Foundation. Says its annual report: "A number of students, the pride of fond parents and the heroes of small towns, suffer acutely from a feeling of inferiority and failure in a large university setting." The Foundation considers it the task of the mental specialist to help such a student get adjusted to his new life.

**TAX FAILED**  
PEKING, July 23.—An attempt to raise \$400,000 extra for the military factories of North China by taxing every telephone subscriber in Peking \$30 extra for the use of the instrument has come to naught as a result of the storm of protests raised by Chinese merchants.

## SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

**PRE-EMPTIONS**  
Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C. or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

**PURCHASE**  
Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes, minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

**HOMESITE LEASES**  
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 30 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

**LEASES**  
For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

**GRAZING**  
Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free or partly free permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to 10 head.
