ARCHDEACON'S SON ON VISIT INDIAN VILLAGE

J. M. Collison Guest of Haida Chief After Many Years Absence From Islands

SKIDEGATE, July 14.—H. Collison of Prince Rupert is taking over the management of the Imperial Oil Company's station here. R. McCallum, who has been in charge, is leaving on account of illness.

Mr. Collison was accompanied here by his brother, J. M. Collison, this being the first trip of the Collison brothers to the islands in twenty years.

While here, J. M. Collison, who is a son of the late Archdeacon Collison, who was for some years a missionary on the islands, was asked to visit the Skidegate Mission which he did. He was the guest of Chief Russ, who 47 years before paddled over to Metlakatla and asked the late Archdeacon to visit Skidegate and send a missionary there. Mr. Collison was shown the remains of the huge cedar lodge where his father camped and where the first church service was held. Along with a correspondent of the Daily News Mr. Russ entertained the visitor to dinner and interesting stories of the early days were told.

Chief Russ is a brother-in-law of the late Chief Sega, mentioned in Archdeacon Collison's book, "The Wake of the War Canoe."

Chief and Mrs. Russ in bidding adieu to their visitor expressed the pleasure it had given them to entertain the son of the great chief, Archdeacon Collison. The last time they had seen him he was a baby in his mother's arms.

SURPLUS FROM LIGHT CITY OF EDMONTON

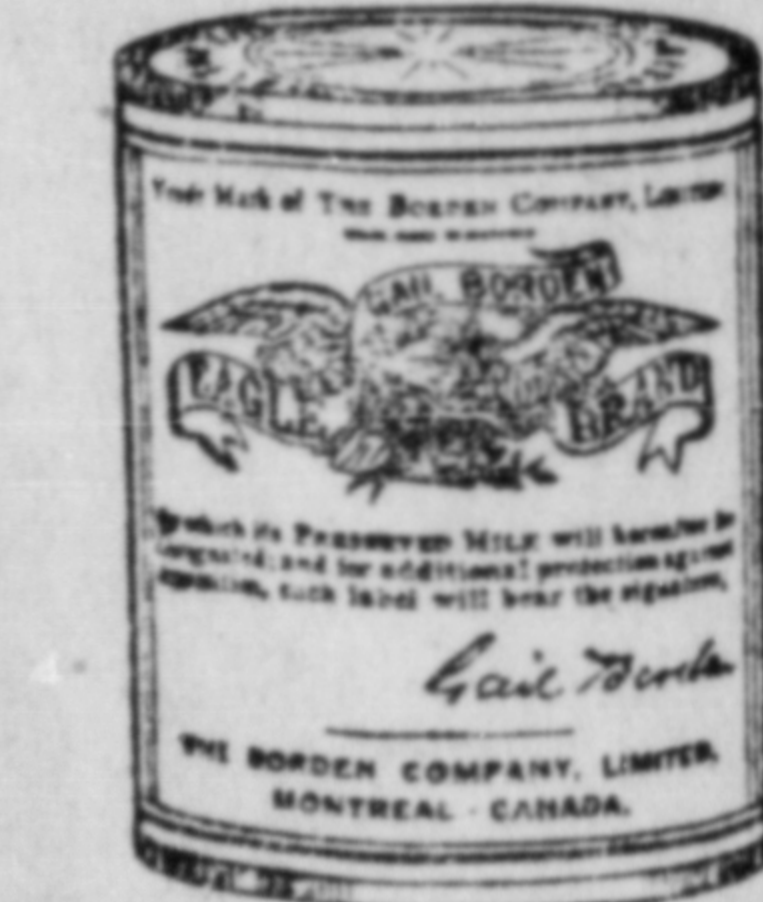
EDMONTON, July 14.—Electric light services are still helping to swell the civic exchequer, judging by the monthly report received by the commissioners. For the first six months of the year, this utility shows a net surplus of \$85,345 or \$7,396 more than during the similar period of last year. Last month the surplus was \$3,800, an increase of \$338 over a year ago.
