ART EDUCATION NEEDED



AN EXCHANGE

I have not explored the territory cast of this boundary, but have been a considerable tract or comparatively level country, much of it mineralized and it is my judgment that if Alaska's boundary line could be extended back to the interior to a line extending in northeasterly direction from just boundary of interior Alaska, it would search and development of a section

Instead of nationalizing Skagway tract extending to the boundary, from the United States to Canada, for a tract from Canada to the United States Haines, to the southeasterly boundary of interior Alaska. I am fully convinced that such an exchange would benefit both parties concerned, and stimulate commercial activity in sections now neglected.


