Captain Bill Hansen, who represented the North Island trollers, moved that they wire Butedale asking for a packer to come. This was seconded by Captain Sorensen. Word was received from Butedale that they could not send packers so the offer of the Cold Storage boat was accepted. Among the Prince Rupert boats represented at the meeting were the Thelma, Minnie V., Royal, Bonito, Dundas, Seal, Roy W., Bayview and Ada. 
