VANGUARD MINE IN LIMELIGHT

Sensation Caused by Recommendation of Superintendent to Drop Property

Something in the nature of a sensation has been caused in Alice Arm mining camp as a result of announcement made by H. W. Heideman that he would recommend to the Spencer-McRae interests of Vancouver, who have had the property under option, that the showing does not warrant their purchase of the Vanguard mine which, through reputedly rich copper discoveries, has been much in the public eye of late. Word to this effect was brought to the city this afternoon by mining men aboard the steamer Catala on which vessel Mr. Heideman is also a passenger bound for Vancouver where he will report to his principals. Mr. Heideman has been in charge of exploration work on the Vanguard for the Spencer-McRae interests and it is reported that he has already caused work to be shut down on the property.

Alice Arm people feel strongly that the Vanguard is a better mine than Mr. Heideman has apparently concluded it is. They are convinced that he must be mistaken in his judgment and are confident that, if the present interests drop the property, others will be forthcoming immediately to take it over.
