The regular meeting of the Prince Rupert Parent Teacher Association took place last evening in the auditorium of the Booth Memorial School when the presentation of medals and certificates won by the entrance pupils of the city schools took place.

The meeting opened with the singing of "O Canada." After the reading of the minutes an acknowledgement of the receipt of \$20 from the association was read from the Principal of Borden Miss M. Jackson then delighted the

audience with her finished singing of 'A China Tragedy" and "The Lilac" Tree." Miss Lorna Tite accompanied. In the absence of H. B. Rochester, chairman of the school board, the prizes were distributed by J. C. Brady, M.P. Mr. Brady in presenting the prizes for history stressed the importance of this subject.
