CANNOT KEEP THE CITY BACK

If People United in Their Efforts Port is Bound to Become Great Says Visitor

Expressing the opinion that nothing could keep Prince Rupert from becoming a great port, Dave Stevens, who is in the city representing the Vancouver File Driving and Contracting Company in connection with the construction of the road to Galloway Rapids, in addressing the Rotary Club at its luncheon yesterday urged that the people present a united front in the interest of the city. Cohesion of effort was what was needed in order to make things forge ahead.

The road which his company was about to construct would give from seven to eight miles of road from the centre of the city. It was rather difficult to construct but difficulties were made to be overcome. In order to develop Prince Rupert, they must have transportation.

HISTORY PROVES IT

Quoting figures, Mr. Stevens said that the four western provinces were the richest per capita and the strategic position of Prince Rupert was bound to make her a great seaport. History of other places similarly situated proved it. Cities were built largely as a result of commerce and this place promised great development in its commercial possibilities. Behind it was an empire greater than France and Germany put together. The Peace River country produced the finest grain in the world as shown at Chicago recently when it was in competition with the best. Not only did they grow large crops in the Peace River but the wheat weighed seventy pounds to a bushel instead of sixty. Then there was the timber and the minerals. The Peace country was nearer to the Pacific than Germany was to the Atlantic and the trade would flow to Prince Rupert and Vancouver to the benefit of each.

Mr. Stevens again urged that there be cohesion of effort among the Prince Rupert people. Prince Rupert in her growth would not injure other places but each would aid the other. "Never knock, always boost," was his final admonition.
