MAKING TWO MARTYRS

Undoubtedly the conditions are favorable for the making of two martyrs of the red leaders Sacco and Vanzetti who are under sentence to be electrocuted tomorrow on conviction of murder committed seven years ago. Various appeals and stays of proceedings have been obtained which have set the case forward year after year but now it seems as if there would be no further delay and the execution is set for tomorrow.

Sacco and Vanzetti are avowed anarchists. Their political beliefs have been featured both at the first trial and on innumerable occasions since. They were convicted of murdering a shoe factory paymaster and his guard at South Baitree, Mass., in the spring of 1920. The evidence on which they were convicted was circumstantial in character and it is claimed by their friends that they were convicted because they were Reds and for no other reason.

It was vigorously, excitedly proclaimed by their friends that the evidence submitted against them by the district attorney was insufficient, absurd, and false; that the leading witnesses of the prosecution were incompetent and worthless; that the trial judge was biased against the prisoners, behaved improperly at the trial, and misdirected the jury. And that he did so because Sacco and Vanzetti were "radicals" and had been marked down for death by the authorities.

The way of the transgressor is hard, and everyone transgresses sometimes.

REVIEW OF EVIDENCE GRANTED

The accusation of the Red sympathizers falls into two parts. First, that the evidence against the prisoners was worthless; and second, that Judge Thayer was prejudiced against the prisoners. With the second charge only a very small section of the U.S. population would have bothered, but the first charge was legally permissible, and the evidence on which Sacco and Vanzetti were convicted became the subject of intense scrutiny.

Sacco and Vanzetti were not executed. They were held year after year in jail, and the demand that their case should be opened up and retried came prominently into notice at wide intervals. Finally, about a year ago, leave was given to Sacco's and Vanzetti's lawyers to convince the court that a new trial should be granted in order that fresh evidence might be offered for the defence, and after listening to long and determined arguments for the prisoners, the court refused to reopen the case. The judge who thus refused a new trial was the same judge—Thayer—who had found Sacco and Vanzetti guilty six years previously.

DECISION WAS APPEALED

Thayer's decision was appealed before the supreme court of Massachusetts, and was on technical grounds sustained. Sacco and Vanzetti were to die.

The fact that the judge who originally tried them should be the judge who had power to prevent a new trial was deeply regretted by a large and influential section of United States public opinion. This, however, was how the law stood in Massachusetts, and nothing could be done about it. It was competent in such a situation to carry an appeal to the governor of the state, and this was immediately done.

But by this time the two charges in the accusation against the original trial were fused together in the public mind. The assertion that Sacco and Vanzetti had been convicted because they were "reds" was seriously considered as a fact having a heavy bearing on the propriety of the proceedings at their trial.

It was positively asserted by certain legal writers of standing and reputation that Judge Thayer had allowed his detestation of "radicalism" to determine his attitude towards the two accused men. And it was positively asserted also that he had ordered a conviction from evidence which was little short of scandalous in its insufficiency of proof.

In this atmosphere Governor Fuller began his review of the case; announcing as he began it that he had appointed a group of representative citizens to give him advice as he proceeded.

The governor's proceedings were veiled in the deepest secrecy. And he emerges merely to say that Judge Thayer was right and that Sacco and Vanzetti must fulfil their sentence.

FLYING BOATS LONG CRUISE 25,000 MILES

Start in October, Heading for India—Machines Carry Four in Crew and Have Bunks

LONDON, Aug. 10.—(By Canadian Press)—All summer preparations have been going forward for the great cruise to be made by officers and men of the Royal Air Force in four huge supermarine Southampton flying boats. A start will probably be made in October on a flight that eventually will cover about 25,000 miles.

The machines, whose equipment is being completed, will each carry a crew of four, and the first objective of the expedition will be Singapore. Here they will be met by Royal Australian Air Force men in two similar machines, and the six will continue to Australia and around the Australian seaboard. The cruise is to test the capabilities of the metal hulls of which the machines are constructed; to reconnoitre the eastern route with a special eye to likely sites for seaplane bases, and generally show the R.A.F. ensign right across the world.

CAPT. CAVE BROWNE-CAVE

The commander of the flight will be Captain Cave Browne-Cave, D.S.O., D.F.C., one of Britain's most distinguished aces. Squadron-leader G. E. Livock will be second in command.

The flying boats to be used are equipped with two Napier-Lion 450 horsepower engines each. Their metal hulls, it is believed, will give them longer life in the water than wooden hulls, and the hulls are roomy enough to provide ample space for a navigator's chart table and wireless operator's section, with directional wireless.

Gunnery and control cockpits are features of the machines, which contain collapsible bunks so that the crew of four men each can sleep aboard.

Serviceability and not speed is the main idea in the flight. Two spare machines of the same type will be first sent to Singapore as reserves for use if necessary.

Two more boats of the same type, but with wooden hulls, are being completed here for the Australian government, and these are the ones which will join the flight at Singapore.

FOLLOW ROUND COAST

The flight will coast all round India up to Calcutta, probably calling at Colombo en route. A seaplane flight round the India coast has never yet been made, for the seaplanes of Colonel de Pinedo and Sir Alan Cobham crossed India by means of the rivers. Singapore will be the next important port of call, and in view of the naval developments there the visit of this flight will certainly be of considerable importance. Probably the Australian flight will meet the home flight there, and both will then proceed to Darwin and round the west and south coasts of Australia to Melbourne. The most difficult part of this last stage is crossing the Great Australian Bight. But Wing Commander Cybelle once flew across the Bight in a Fairey float seaplane, so the six Southamptons ought to be able to manage it.

The whole cruise will cover some 25,000 miles, and in all probability Group Captain Cave Browne-Cave and his party will be away from home for the best part of a year.

PROSPERITY MINE NEAR STEWART SAID TO BE VERY RICH

A. B. Tritts Declares It Best Surface Showing he had Ever Seen

Reports couched in language which seems extravagant continue to come in from the Prosperity, but when a man with the known ability and conservatism of A. B. Tritts says without reservation "It is the greatest showing of surface ore I have ever seen in my life," the statements of various visitors to the property do not seem so overdrawn says the Portland Canal News. Mr. Tritts, who was one of the original syndicate of four who opened up the famous Premier mine, spent two days on the Prosperity this week in company with his engineer, Major Angus Davis, and both are enthusiastic over the new operation.

The main Prosperity vein from which 30 tons of ore were mined and shipped by the original owners last fall without doing any blasting, has been traced by open cuts clear across the property, and in one place is more than eight feet in width of solid ore which assays more than \$400 per ton in silver, lead and gold. A short crosscut tunnel is now being driven to gain about 50 feet of depth on the vein and form a basis for winter operations. A stone house, 52 x 19 feet inside dimensions, has been built to house the crew.
