RELAY RACE AT COBALT

Northern News and Y.M.C.A. Arrange Event for October 22

COBALT, Ont., Oct. 11.—Preparations are being completed for the running of an all-northern relay race, over a course of 11 miles on Saturday afternoon, Oct. 22. The cream of Northern Ontario's runners will participate in the event, which is being sponsored by the Northern News, Cobalt, in affiliation with the Cobalt Y.M.C.A. The course lies over the Ferguson highway, from New Liskeard, through Halleybury to Cobalt.

Six-man teams will compete, the age limit being 18 years. Entries have been promised from Timmins High School, New Liskeard High School, Halleybury High School, Kirkland Lake Continuation School, Englehart Continuation School, Elk Lake Boy Scouts, Cobalt Holy Name Society, Cobalt Bay Scouts, Swastika school. In addition there are about six "possibles" to be heard from, including teams from Iroquois Falls and Cochrane. A silver shield, offered by the Northern News for annual competition, will be held for a year by the winning team. Silver medals will be awarded each runner on the second team to finish.

HANSON TIMBER WAS RECOVERED

Poles Which Broke Loose in Swiftly Rising River Mostly Recovered on Sunday and Monday

By yesterday, the Hanson Lumber & Timber Co. had recovered pretty well all of 3,000 poles, valued at several thousand dollars, which were swept down the Skeena River following the breaking of the boom at Cedarvale early Sunday morning before the rush of a suddenly engorged river which, as a result of recent heavy rains in the interior, raised three feet in five hours. Immediately after the break, all gas-boats and men along the river were crossed into service with the result that a practically successful salvage was effected. Poles were picked up as far down the river as Terrace.

With the cessation of the deluge of rain that was general over the weekend, waters were receding yesterday according to reports brought on the afternoon train. The thermometer dropped to 22 above zero at Smithers and Hazelton during Sunday night and early Monday morning and there was heavy frost owing to the previous damp conditions.
