Pethick, assistant district engineer for the department, who was in town last week, announced, the main highway west of Hazelton will be widened and gravelled through to Hazelton. Most of the road work for the present season has now been completed.

Some 9,000 yards of rock to be used in river protection work being undertaken by the provincial department of public works was loosened last week in a big blast at the rock quarry near the Bear River bridge.

J. A. Hall of Hyder and E. E. Hall of Winnipeg have purchased control of the old Bear River Mining Co., owning nine claims adjoining the George Copper in the Bear River valley, from W. R. Tonkin. A new company to be known as the Gold Copper Mines will be incorporated with capitalization of \$3,000,000.

Zinc, gold and silver ore going as high as \$155 per ton has been opened up during the season by Herb Hunter and P. Suppela on the Little Wonder group of eight claims lying north of Bitter Creek at an elevation of 3,700 feet.

It is reported that the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co. has acquired something over forty claims in the vicinity of the George Copper. Big developments will, it is understood, be undertaken by the company in that region next spring.

W. T. Batcheller, Seattle hydro-electric engineer, has completed an examination of hydro-electric power possibilities at Meziaden Lake and the Naas River for J. A. Hall and E. E. Hall.

During the winter a 1500 foot tunnel will be driven by the Premier Gold Mining Co. on the Prosperity property. The Premier has completed payments for fifty-two percent in the Prosperity and has acquired a further 24 per cent. D. L. Pitt, manager of the Premier, denies that the company has any immediate intention of putting in a tram-line.

The Portland Canal News is hopeful about the Dunwell situation. It states that the situation has been "greatly exaggerated by a series of groundless rumors in many cases false statements, emanating often from people who have never seen the property."

PRINCE GEORGE

General F. A. Sutton, who proposes to form a company to build a line of railway into the Peace River district, addressed the Prince George Board of Trade at a luncheon last Thursday evening in the Prince George Hotel. General Sutton and party motored up from Vancouver.

The city has allowed the local telephone company an extension of time until December in the matter of the

City receipts during the first nine months of this year have totalled \$102,247.53 according to a statement issued by George E. Davis, city collector. Of this, \$61,000.66 has been derived through the payment of taxes; \$17,319.33 was contributed by the electric light services; \$8998 by water rates; police court fines, \$1968.70, and trade licenses, \$4,199.80.

Charles A. MacKay of Victoria, representing the Seikirk Mining Syndicate, announces that work will be carried out this winter on the company's Ferguson group property on the Ingineke River. A party of eight men is now on the way from the coast to be employed at the mine.

A four-hundred pound exhibit of wheat grain, potatoes and field roots grown on farms in this district has been sent by R. G. Sutton, district agriculturalist, to the Toronto Winter Fair.

J. O. Wilson, secretary of the Prince George Board of Trade, has received a letter from Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, congratulating this district on the splendid showing it made at the Prince Rupert Exhibition.
