TERRIFIC GALES IN GREAT BRITAIN

GENERAL SUTTON MUCH TO FORE IN VANCOUVER TODAY

Sutton Proposal for Building Railway into the Peace River Country Laid Before Premier

General addresses Vancouver Board of Trade in regard to matter and interviews
Dr. J. D. MacLean

SAYS MONEY CAME FROM CHINESE

VANCOUVER, October 29. — Conviction that the extension of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway into the Peace River country would pay under a proper scheme of land settlement and development and that funds could be arranged in the Old Country was expressed by General Sutton to the Board of Trade yesterday.

The General said he might not be able to build the railway himself but if he made enough fuss, some others who had been sitting on the fence would do it and he would have done that much good.

CURVICH WINS FROM FERGUSON

Local Fighter Proves Far Superior to His Anyox Opponent Last Night

SEVERAL OTHER BOUTS

ANYOX, Oct. 29.—Last night Battling Curvich of Prince Rupert, 152 pounds, knocked out James Ferguson of Anyox, 140 pounds, in the fifth round. Ferguson was knocked down in the fourth round and took a count of nine.

Curvich proved far superior to his opponent throughout the bout.

In the preliminaries Russel McMillan, 130 pounds, of Anyox won from Eddie Smith, 95 pounds, of Prince Rupert. Eddie put up a game fight against superior weight but was forced to quit in the second round.

Henry Deeth of Anyox won from Nick Curvich by decision in a four round bout.

WRESTLING MATCH

One of the features of the evening was an amateur wrestling match between Allan Keeton, 125 pounds of Vancouver and Dick Stubbs of Anyox, 147 pounds, which went for four ten minute rounds without decision. In the first two rounds there were no falls. In the third Allan Keeton secured a fall with hammerlock and leg headlock in a little over one minute. In the last round Dick Stubbs secured a body scissors on Keeton, forcing him to concede a fall. Keeton was obviously hurt by the scissors and both contestants agreed to call the match off.

NINE HALIBUT BOATS REFUSE SALE TODAY

Bid of 12c and 6c not satisfactory so
Fares totalling 122,000 Pounds
are held over

Four American vessels with 103,000 pounds and five Canadians with 19,000 pounds refused to accept a price of 12c and 6c offered all around at the Fish Exchange this morning and, up to 2.30 this afternoon, all were signifying their intention of holding the halibut over until Monday in the hope of obtaining better prices at that time. A big shipment of frozen fish being put on the market from Alaska within the past day or so is said to be the cause for the sharp decline in price. The boats in today are as follows:

American—Majestic, 21,000 pounds; Atlantic, 22,000 pounds; Republic, 20,000; Eagle, 40,000.

Canadian—Morris H., 5,500; Balsac, 6,000; Ingrid H., 3,500; Cape Spencer, 2,500; Nuba, 1,500.

THOUSAND BUFFALOES TO BE SLAUGHTERED AT WAINWRIGHT PARK

OTTAWA, Oct. 29.—Only 1,000 head of buffaloes are to be slaughtered at Wainwright National Park next month. This will be the first time since 1925 that fewer than 2,000 head have been killed.

J. B. Harkin, superintendent of National Parks, stated that, through the number slaughtered and those transported to Wood Buffalo Park in Northern Alberta, the strength of the Wainwright herd had been reduced to a point where the forage was sufficient. It was not necessary, therefore, to slaughter as many as in previous years. Slaughtering, it is expected, will be done, as last year, by a packing house. The government will call for tenders. In 1926 the bid of the Pat Burns Company was accepted.

FAILED TO CROSS SEA IN SMALL YACHT

LONDON, Oct. 28.—"I've lost everything I had in the 'Joan,' except what I have here," said W. E. Sinclair, a South London schoolmaster, holding up a small brown parcel, when he arrived at Liverpool from Canada on the Canadian Pacific liner Montrose.

A member of the Erith Yacht Club, W. E. Sinclair at the end of June sailed from the Thames for Iceland with Richard M. Jackson, a young Northampton law student, in the 22-ft. yawl, "Joan."

After reaching Iceland they resolved to cross the Atlantic but encountered a terrific storm which carried away their mast. After baling out water for 36 hours they were picked up and taken to Montreal.

ANOTHER ITALIAN STEAMER WRECKED

PENANCE, Oct. 29.—Seven men were drowned when the Italian steamer Isabo from Montreal bound for Hamburg went ashore near here.

Careless Work in Vancouver Police Court Results Two Prisoners Being Released

VANCOUVER, October 29.—Two prisoners, one convicted of theft and the other waiting trial on a charge of having narcotic drugs in his possession, are at liberty as a result of an effortless jailbreak.

At police headquarters yesterday, one was convicted on a charge of breaking and entering and remanded for sentence until this morning. Through a clerical error this case was marked "undismissed" on the records and when his name was called, Chin Hin, awaiting trial on a drug charge, stepped forward, signed off and took his departure. Before the error was discovered in the court sheets Chang was also released. The police are now making an effort to locate the two.

Steamer Fishpool Arrived Last Night and Moored to Elevator Ready to Load Cargo of Grain

The British freighter Fishpool, Capt. F. Tate, first vessel of the season to load grain at the Alberta Wheat Pool's Prince Rupert elevator, slipped quietly into the harbor at 11.30 last night after an eighteen day passage across the Pacific Ocean from Muroan, Japan, and at 7 o'clock this morning took up her berth at the elevator where she passed quarantine and customs examination preparatory to commencing the loading of a full cargo of grain for the United Kingdom or continent. The Fishpool left Muroan on October 9 and had an uneventful voyage, encountering bad weather as she neared the north end of the Queen Charlotte Islands. After sighting Langara light on Thursday, she had to put out again on account of a raging southeast gale. On account of the unfavorable elements Capt. Larry Thomson, the pilot, had to go beyond Triple Island, the usual boarding place, to pick the vessel up.

The Fishpool is already lined so she is in shape to start loading her cargo at once. It is expected that she will sail after the middle of next week. Outbound, she will make a call at Union Bay to coal.

Belonging to Ropner & Co. of England, the Fishpool is a vessel of the same fleet as the Otterpool and Sedgpool which loaded grain at Prince Rupert last season. She is 379 feet long with a beam of 56 feet.

A grain train of thirty-four cars arrived in the local railway yards this morning and is being rushed into the elevator for conveyance to the ship. Well over one hundred carsloads have now arrived here and loadings today are reported to be over four hundred cars.

DOCTOR NOT GUILTY MANSLAUGHTER CASE

VANCOUVER, Oct. 29.—Dr. J. S. Gladwin, charged with manslaughter arising out of the death of Kathleen Black, 19 years of age, on July 12, was found not guilty. The jury deliberated seven minutes.

Puerile and Unseemly Squabble Between B.C. Judges Continues by Morrison Replying to Martin

VANCOUVER, October 29.—Mr. Justice Morrison in the latest exchange between the Supreme Court and the Court of Appeals, says the judgment of Wednesday in which Mr. Justice Martin reiterated his criticisms of Morrison's findings in the McCabe children case was "a fictitious judgment" because the parties thereto had abandoned the claim to the custody of the children involved.

Judge Morrison characterized Judge Martin's judgment as made up of trite platitudes and trite law quotations, which did not properly present facts, garnished with offensive and insulting remarks. Continuing, he said: "This peculiar kind of judgment is not without precedent in the course of Mr. Justice Martin's long judicial experience."

Westerly Gale Swept British Isles During Night Causing Damage

Part of Hospital at Lancaster cut off by Tidal Wave and Sixteen Patients Were Rescued in Boats

LONDON, October 29.—Nine people were killed and there was considerable property damage as the result of a westerly gale which swept the British Isles last night. Various parts of the country report houses damaged and roofs blown off, while hundreds of telephone wires are down, trains are at a standstill, and roads blocked with trees.

On the coast steamers were torn adrift by the force of the wind. The coast of Lancashire in particular suffered. A tidal wave swept the city of Lancaster, cutting off a portion of the hospital so that sixteen patients had to be rescued in boats.

TOO EARLY FOR ANNOUNCEMENT

B.C. Bishops' House, Not General Synod, Will Deal With Caledonia Bishop Matter

It is too early yet to make any announcement as to the appointment of a bishop for Caledonia diocese to succeed the late Archbishop F. H. DuVernet, states Archdeacon G. A. Rix, administrator of the diocese, who returned to the city on the Prince Rupert this morning after having spent several months in Eastern Canada engaged in raising finances with a view to the re-establishment of a bishop in the diocese. Final pronouncement in the matter, Archdeacon Rix points out, will be made, not by the general synod of Canada but, by the British Columbia House of Bishops. Reports published during the recent general synod in Toronto while not inaccurate, were misleading he states. It will be at least two weeks before any announcement may be expected.

Mrs. Rix, who was in the East part of the time with Archdeacon Rix, is now visiting in Vancouver and is expected home next Wednesday.
